Principal's Report

Parents are aware of the significant impact the teacher shortage is having on our school. Fortunately staffing levels in primary are good, with the engagement of a full-time teacher to cover day to day absences for sick leave etc. However the picture in secondary is not as rosy. We currently have seven full-time teaching positions which have been unfilled since the beginning of the year. Most are permanent vacancies, some are temporary vacancies due to staff on maternity leave. In addition we have no secondary casual teachers to cover day-today leave.

As a result some secondary elective classes have been cancelled, and some senior classes moved to Distance Education. Last week I sent home information via the app in regard to minimal supervision arrangements. This is the first time we could not cover junior classes and initiated minimal supervision in the playground for students Year 7-10 for some lessons. Surrounding schools such as Scone and Muswellbrook High have been using minimal supervision in the playground for the past 18 months. This is a measure we have tried to avoid for as long as possible, however it has now become necessary. Supervision requirements will be assessed daily, based on teacher staffing levels. As always our year advisers and student support officer are available to assist students who may be struggling with this impact on their learning. I am always available to meet with parents who may have concerns, particularly in regard to our senior students.

I would like to thank Hollie Hunt, President of the P&C, committee members and parents who have been so supportive of our staff during this difficult period. Since the media attention on our school the department has announced we will receive priority recruitment support.

Priority recruitment support provides additional incentives to attract staff to our school. Vacant positions now attract a relocation payment between \$6000-8000 to assist applicants with removal expenses, and in some circumstances a recruitment bonus of \$20,000 is available. As yet we have had no successful applicants apply for these positions, even with the additional financial incentives.

The Teacher Housing Authority is planning to construct three new properties in Merriwa to improve the availability and standard of accommodation to teachers when they relocate. Teachers will be charged rent at market rates on these properties when completed. The shortage of local rentals has impacted on our ability to attract candidates to vacant positions. Several of our staff have been forced to live out of town due the shortage of local accommodation.

Whilst it has become increasingly difficult to attract professionals (teachers, nurses, vetinarians etc) to country areas, we hope that these incentives will assist us to fill some of the teacher vacancies.


9 May. Parents are encouraged to come along and discuss their child's progress with the class teacher. Bookings for parent interviews can be made by contacting the office.

Driving Lessons


We are lucky enough to work in conjunction with this program for the second year in a row to offer our students the ability to gain their licence and undertake the practical component of their driving licence.

Bale to Bobbin to Beanie

Year 11 and 12 Agriculture students visited the Nundle Woollen Mill as part of their Farm Product Study on wool production.

The mill is the last wool spinning mill of its kind still operating in Australia and the only spinning mill in the world commercially operating machines over 100 years old. The wool supplied to the mill is 22-23 micron, low vegetable matter polwarth merino wool from Elsdon in Tasmania.

Students were able to witness the steps involved in processing the wool from opening, carding, spinning to dying and ball winding. They were able to appreciate value adding whilst admiring the range of products made and sold at the mill shop. They enjoyed the opportunity to ask questions and apply the theory recently learnt in class in a practical setting.

That evening we dined at an Italian restaurant where there was only one rule - no phones. This was great as we all spoke to each other about the day and continued to build our relationships across the group.

Saturday brought with it a different challenge, not only the heat but we were sent on a scavenger hunt across the city of Adelaide. We were given paper maps and could also use google maps to find the different monuments and would check in with the adults via the what's app. Some of the things we saw were the Haighs Chocolate Shop, Central Markets, City Library and the Zoo to name a few. The last instruction we were given was to meet at Glenelg under the Ferris Wheel by 1.00pm.
