

Principal's Report

Welcome back to all students after an incredibly uncertain time with COVID-19. There are many advantages to living in the country, some of which are highlighted during a pandemic-plenty of space and fresh air resulting in lower rates of infection. With the return to school we don't have to worry about our students sharing crowded inner city buses with a throng of daily commuters.

RETURN TO FACE-TO-FACE LEARNING

All schools have returned to full on-campus learning from Monday May 25. All school activities and operations will be in line with Australian Health Protection Principal Committee External link (AHPPC) and NSW Health guidelines as applicable.

HEALTH GUIDELINES

School students do not need to follow strict adult physical distancing guidelines, but should follow good hygiene practices like:

- regularly washing hands
- avoiding sharing drinks or food
- coughing or sneezing into your elbow, or a tissue which should be discarded immediately

ATTENDANCE

All students should be at school unless:

- they have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition
- they are currently unwell

REPORTS

Assessment for reporting will include learning at school and the learning from home. Naturally we don't expect parents to be teachers, and that progress may be mixed. Essentially we have all done our best in difficult circumstances.

However for our secondary students we do expect that they have kept up with the work issued by their teachers. For our Year 11 and 12 students this is critical. Year 12 reports have been issued this week.

Semester 1 reports will be completed by the start of Term 3. This will be a simplified version of the report you normally receive.

SCHOOL CLEANING

Additional cleaning is in place in line with the AHPPC guidelines and advice from NSW Health. Target areas include high-touch areas and other hard surfaces, door handles, lockers, light switches and handrails and movement areas. There will also be additional cleaning of toilets and bubblers and topping up of supplies like soap.

SCHOOL GROUNDS

Only essential visitors to school grounds. There should be no visitors to school sites unless they are essential eg teaching and cleaning staff. Additional activities like scripture and music lessons are currently on hold. Parents are asked to continue "kiss and drop" and afternoon pick-up arrangements.

SCHOOL FEES WAIVED

School fees have been waived for all students Kinder-12 due to the impact of the drought and COVID-19 on many families. For those who have already paid school fees they will be credited towards 2021 fees in advance. Alternatively, parents can request a refund (please contact the office for details).

CANTEEN

The P and C operated canteens will re-open after the June long weekend. Our volunteers will review the health advice in regard to canteens and restock in preparation for opening.

Primary canteen will open on Tuesday after the long weekend, then return to its normal Monday operations. The secondary canteen will resume operations on the Wednesday after the long weekend.

TECHNOLOGY RETURN

If the school provided assistance with technology (loan of laptops and/or dongles) during the learning from home period, we ask that parents return these devices. We are keen to return these items to classrooms now that students are back at school.

STAGE THREE - BACK WITH A BANG!

Wow its week 5! We have all had a unique start to Term 2 but I am pleased to report Stage 3 have done an awesome job and we have had lots of great learning occurring during this time, both at home and school. We certainly have all enjoyed being back together over the last week.

Learning about the techniques used in persuasive texts has allowed for some great discussions and learning. These persuasive techniques have been very useful during Mr Borg's debating lessons. Some of the books which students are reading during reading groups include 'Playing Beatie Bow' and 'The Cay'. Both books have allowed for an in-depth study of the author's themes and messages. Students have been able to identify with the main characters in both texts. Special thank you to Mrs Collins, who is just as excited as the students to find out what is going to happen next in the books.

During our Maths sessions we have enjoyed completing work in our Maths groups with Stage 2 before moving back into class groups. Last week the students consolidated skills to solve 2, 3- and 4-digit multiplication problems. The students had to demonstrate the algorithm method, plus two other methods called the area model and the lattice method. These may seem complicated to people but find a Stage 3 student to explain them to you. It is adding skills to their toolbox and helping them solve real life maths problems-without a calculator!

In 2015 Pope Francis wrote an encyclical called Laudato Si ('Praise be to you') - On the Care for Our Common Home. This is the Church's most profound and comprehensive statement yet on caring for creation and the poorest. Stage 3 have been discussing aspects of this paper and are currently organising a "Nude Food" day as a way for them to stop and reflect on how they can care for creation and the world we live in. This will occur during our Wellbeing Week activities not only looking after our own wellbeing but the wellbeing of the world in which we live.

The ASPIRE Creative arts organisation- part of the Catholic School Office has created a competition for the students to create a sculpture of a bird which will be placed in the foyer for the upcoming Aspire performance- rescheduled for January. The students are collecting recyclable material, researching types of birds and designing. We are all look forward to getting started on building our creations.

Thanks to the wonderful technology we have become very familiar with, we held a Zoom meeting with Anna Kerrigan – Artistic Director of Aspire- to commence the planning for our school play to be held in September this year. Great ideas and themes came across. We look forward to again working with Anna. Stay tuned for updates.

Thank you to Merriwa Central School for supporting our school.


WOULD YOU RATHER BE A FISH OR A BIRD?


Henry was chosen for this award because he has bounced through the school gate every day full of energy and ready to learn. Congratulations Henry!

THE WIDENING LENS OF COVID -19

Throughout the global Covid-19 pandemic, we have done everything possible to ensure the safety and well-being of our staff, students and their families locally. Of course, the first and most important hurdle is communication and regardless of the uncertainty, together we have been able to maintain the chain of information between families and staff so we are aware of who will be attending each day and what our staffing requirements are. This is so important as we manage the safe and staggered intake of children and staff over the term.

Health and hygiene is closely knitted to early childhood education at the best of times and now all children are having their temperatures taken and families are signing a disclosure statement on arrival. Our risk assessment is lengthy and comprehensive, with social distancing being promoted and limits on children permitted on play equipment and tabled activities. Small items, such as Lego are off the program for the term and so too is playdough and large group activities. As you know it is nearly impossible to restrict the movements and affection from children for each other and for their teachers, so despite all the processes and practices in place the best thing we can all do is to stay home if you are unwell or if your child becomes unwell, especially as the cooler weather approaches.

There is no doubt that Covid-19 has given us plenty of time for reflection, and this term the children will be examining their connection to the world through the lens of Covid -19. But it's not all bad news, despite the difficulties it has presented, it has also given us plenty to be thankful for, which we will be touching on as part of learning, Term 2.

We are grateful that:

- we are in a reasonably low risk area, with the figures that we hear everyday on the news, the benefits of being in a small community are valuable
- people stayed at home and are keeping our community safe in particular our aged population
- · our children have families who are doing

- everything possible to put them first with love, care, health and education
- the government acted quickly, providing support to our educators and staff through the job keeper payments and our operational funding
- we have a strong and resilient world, and that our pollution levels have lowered substantially during restrictions
- people are adaptive and can make impactful changes
- we have amazing health care workers and people who are working across all areas in health and science throughout this pandemic including those actively researching a vaccine for Covid -19.

What we hope that:

- a dynamic recovery plan is implemented
- the 1 million people in Australia who lost their jobs will have their employment rebuilt in manufacturing, recycling, agriculture and renewable energy
- businesses recover with 4 billion being lost from our economy each week due to trading restrictions

REFLECTION PENTECOST SUNDAY John 20:19-23

In the other Gospels there is a scene within the ministry of Jesus when he sends the disciples out to preach, heal and cast out demons. In this Johannine Gospel the missioning of disciples does not occur until after the Resurrection. Prior to the crucifixion Jesus is the only one on mission from his Father, but now as he returns to the Father that mission is to continue through his disciples. Just as Jesus' mission began with the coming of the Spirit to dwell with him, so also the mission of the disciples begins as Jesus breathes on them the gift of the Spirit.

Jesus' mission had been to reveal God's love for the world and to overcome the power of evil that held people back from believing and accepting this great gift of love. The disciples are similarly empowered. They are given authority from Jesus to announce the forgiveness of sin. No longer are people to be held back from God by fear and guilt.

In this Gospel the evangelist shows this power already operating in the extraordinary change that happens to the disciples. They are locked in on themselves, afraid, possibly reliving their failures over recent days. Then suddenly the Risen One is present. All fear and failure is immediately banished and replaced by joy and peace. May the power of God's Spirit inflame our hearts with the Easter gifts of peace and joy.

Come Bird of Paradise, hover anew over this time, this place.

Spread your brooding wings afar to gather all the lost.

Blaze with your incandescent light in hearts trapped by fear.

Dispel the clouds of despair

And breathe

Breathe into our dried up hopes your cosmic breath of life.

Come gracious breath of Love,

Play your subtle melodies in our heart.

Attune our ears to your vibrant stirrings to catch your rhythm and harmony pulsing in our lives.

Draw us from our solitary notes into the symphony of your Triune life

REMINDED TO BE AWARE OF HENDRA

Hunter Local Land Services is urging horse owners to be aware that winter 2020 may provide suitable climatic conditions and subsequently a period of heightened risk for Hendra Virus cases in horses.

The case in the Upper Hunter last year, suggests that we must not become complacent and that Hendra virus infections can occur in our area.

BatOneHealth (batonehealth.org) are a global team of experts who have been studying the complex interactions between climate, land use, flying fox ecology, Hendra virus dynamics and the concurrent risk to horses and humans.

District Veterinarian Kristi Arnot said this group has recently advised that Winter 2020 represents a period of heightened risk for Hendra Virus spill over into horse populations. "There were similar climatic and ecological conditions leading up to Winter 2011 and winter 2017, which saw the largest numbers of equine cases, and the prediction is for similar climatic conditions this year," said Kristi.

"June through to October is considered a highrisk time for Hendra infection in horses, because flying foxes are under pressure to find food in winter.

"Actions now by vets and their clients can reduce this risk by ensuring horses are protected from infection, please be aware if there is sufficient close contact between an infected horse and a person then human infection becomes possible."

Hendra virus is a virus carried by flying foxes (who are unaffected by the virus) and can be deadly to both humans and horses. Hendra virus is transmitted from flying fox to horse, via the ingestion by the horse of flying fox bodily fluids most likely dropped from overhead trees contaminating pasture, feed, water troughs etc. Hendra virus can then be spread from horse to horse, horse to dog and horse to human via close contact with respiratory secretions, blood or any other bodily fluid from an infected horse.

"Since the disease was first recognised in 1994, 62 outbreaks have been recorded with 104 horse deaths and 7 human infections have resulted in 4 deaths," said Kristi.

"To protect both your horses and yourself, it is recommended to vaccinate your horse, as there is no human vaccine."

There is no specific treatment for infected horses, and euthanasia is often required on welfare grounds whilst awaiting test results.

"Your decision whether or not to vaccinate your horse should be made in consultation with your veterinarian.," said Kristi.

"This is an important discussion to have with your private veterinary practitioner so that they can safely attend and treat your horse in times of illness.

"Access to veterinary attention may not always be available for unvaccinated horses."

Merriwa Pharmacy

"What interesting times we live in" seems to have been the most common sentiment both in our community and around the world since the arrival of COVID-19.

It is encouraging to see some aspects of life returning to "normal" however there is still a long way to go before we can be considered safe from the reaches of this virus.

With the easing of government enforced restrictions the onus of responsibility now falls on us as individuals and as a community to continue to protect the most vulnerable.

The isolation and disempowerment felt by many in our community during this time has been relieved a little by the diligent work of Merriwa Helping Hands with Rob Tindall, Tash Taaffe and Edith Shipway leading a band of volunteers to help advise the community what support is available and to identify any needs that are not being met. They have even secured some mulch hay which they have delivered around the community. It is great that we have people in our community that rise to meet a challenge.

You have probably noticed that at Merriwa Pharmacy we have implemented a number of changes to our operating procedures due to COVID-19. Currently our front door is locked during opening hours so that we can limit the number of customers in the store at any time. Before entering the pharmacy customers will be asked if they are experiencing any temperatures, cold and flu symptoms or symptoms consistent with COVID-19. We have also installed sneeze guards on our front counters and whilst we still accept cash we encourage the use of EFTPOS payment where possible. On the advice of the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia we have temporarily ceased our blood pressure measuring service.

It is essential that we protect pharmacy staff from infection in order to avoid any disruption to pharmacy services.

COVID-19 has placed medication supply chains under some significant pressure leading to temporary limits on the amount of medication that we can supply to patients. It now looks like supply is returning to normal however we encourage patients to keep at least one weeks supply of medication in hand. Patients with seasonal respiratory conditions are advised to contact their doctor to obtain prescriptions for reliever and preventative medications.

Merriwa pharmacy would like to take this opportunity to thank our community for the patience, support and understanding that you have shown since the advent of COVID-19. There is a long way to go before we can consider ourselves not at risk so we must work together as a community and as individuals to minimise the risks of COVID-19 to our community.

Let's keep encouraging each other to innovate and find safe ways to work, play and socialise.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

I would like to commend the residents in our Shire for the manner in which they have conducted themselves during these COVID-19 times. I have witnessed many acts of human kindness and have felt the ever increasing presence of our community spirit. It is important we continue in this manner and aim to keep everyone connected. Whether that be by a simple 'hello' over the fence or down the street, an offer of help between neighbours, or by continuing to shop local, supporting the local economy and protecting local jobs. Every action makes a difference.

On May 15, we commenced the stage one release of NSW Government restrictions.

The following is allowed:

- outdoor gatherings of up to 10 people
- cafes and restaurants can seat 10 patrons at any one time and continue to provide takeaway services
- up to 5 visitors may visit another household at any one time
- weddings can have up to 10 guests plus the celebrant and couple
- indoor funerals can have up to 20 mourners and outdoor funerals up to 30
- religious gatherings and places of worship can have up to 10 worshippers
- outdoor playground and exercise equipment can be used with caution
- outdoor pools will be open with restrictions

What does this mean for our Shire?

All public toilets are now open

- Our playgrounds, barbecues and skate parks are open. Any gatherings must be with less than 10 people and social distancing must be observed
- All four golf courses are open to local residents with a game of golf able to be played with up to four people - observing the strict controls in place. Please see the relevant club for details
- Our public pools will remain closed as per normal winter closure

This is a huge step forward for all of us in the fight against COVID-19, one in which we have earned by following public health orders and respecting and preserving our health and wellbeing as a community. I will remind you, we enter this new phase with caution. Now is not the time to become complacent, now more than ever we need to work together to protect the community from COVID-19 by:

- Washing your hands with soap often for at least 20 seconds
- Keeping a distance from others (at least 1.5 metres)
- Coughing and sneezing into your elbow
- Putting tissues in the bin right away
- Staying at home if you feel unwell and seek appropriate medical advice
- Being mindful of others to ensure everyone can safely access and use the public spaces

I am proud of what we have achieved as a community and have every confidence we will continue to work together and support each other through this crisis.

The restrictions around COVID-19 made it urgent that we help businesses open their e-doors to online customers in and outside the shire," Cr Bedggood said.

"There is a need for contact-free shopping opportunities to increase sales and keep small businesses afloat. Not only will the virtual shopping precinct increase the profile of businesses but also provide goods to our communities without the need for people to leave their homes. Through the website it's easy to see who offers click and collect, home delivery or postage of goods and services."

A local radio advertising campaign started this week to ensure the 'buy local' message is delivered.

"At the end of this campaign we hope that every resident explores local purchases before heading out of town or buying online from businesses outside of our Shire," Cr Bedggood said.

"By keeping our local economy strong we attract business opportunities to our towns and ensure jobs for our kids. Our businesses have suffered through three years of drought, and now hit with a pandemic. At no time has the 'buy local' message been more important."



RETAINING THE MERRIWA VISITOR INFORMATION CENTRE

(A letter to the Upper Hunter Shire Council)

It is with great concern that the Merriwa District Progress Association (MDPA) writes to you regarding the future existence and effectiveness of the Merriwa Visitor Information Centre (VIC).

Please be advised that the community of Merriwa and district overwhelmingly opposes any plans to terminate or downgrade the Visitor Information Centre in Bettington Street Merriwa.

You may not be aware that the MDPA strongly opposed a proposal by Council in 2016 to privatise and relocate the VIC, then located in Vennacher Street Merriwa. Our position on any such proposal remains unchanged. The Merriwa VIC should remain in its current location and be owned and operated by Upper Hunter Shire Council (UHSC) staff.

The VIC provides an important service to the local community and to the travelling public. Not only does it provide tourism information promoting local businesses and attractions, but it also provides a service to the local community assisting with private administrative actions.

Those services include:

- assisting with on-line access to MyGov services such as: Centrelink, Medicare and the Australian Taxation Office;
- computer access for setting up email accounts, checking emails, and browsing the internet, etc;
- performing scanning, printing, photocopying and binding of documents for residents who lack these facilities:
- securing bookings and selling tickets for NSW Trainlink and Sid Fogg's Coach Service; and
- hosting a community noticeboard displaying information on local events and notices.

The staff at the VIC provide friendly advice and assistance to local residents to access the services provided. Many elderly residents have not embraced computer technology and do not have their own computer, thereby rendering the VIC as a critical element in their need to access essential administrative services.

Many Government agencies are closing their shopfronts and downgrading their telephone services, encouraging the public to conduct business 'on-line'. This is most difficult for the aged as they have traditionally conducted business on a face-to-face manner or by telephone, and can often avoid technology-based service delivery. This can lead to them suffering financial and social hardships by not availing themselves of vital Government assistance. Due to the aging demography of the residents in Merriwa and district (In 2016 seniors accounted for 27.9% of the Merriwa population), it is essential that the assistance provided by the VIC staff in these matters is maintained.

The Merriwa VIC traditionally offers a valuable service for the travelling public, displaying a collection of booklets, brochures and leaflets promoting local accommodation, attractions and businesses, as well as tourism information on neighbouring regions (including all parts of the Upper Hunter Shire). It is currently ideally located in a prominent position on the junction of roads leading from Denman/Muswellbrook (also Sydney and Newcastle), Scone, Willow Tree/Tamworth and Mudgee/Dunedoo/Dubbo. In its current livery, it is instantly recognised by the travelling public as the traditional repository of information about tourism in the area.

It may not be immediately recognised, but the Merriwa VIC is playing an increasing role in supporting local businesses and improving the long-term economic and social viability of the township and surrounding district.

Whilst many businesses in Merriwa deliver essential support services for local agricultural enterprises, there has been a growth in the number of local businesses taking advantage of the increasing demand to service the travelling public. This trend appears to have developed since the dedication of the Golden Highway, the opening of the Hunter Expressway, and the ever-increasing number of 'baby-boomers' and families travelling within Australia.

There has been a discernible increase in the number of cafes and accommodation venues in Merriwa. The need for more fuel retailers in town has also been identified. This ever-increasing trend for business diversification is essential for the long-term viability of Merriwa. The MDPA recognises the VIC as an essential component in the delivery of tourism support services.

Staff at the Merriwa VIC report a high level of visitation by the travelling public seeking tourist information, and local residents seeking assistance with access to administrative services. This facility is vital to delivering such services to the public and is demonstrably in high demand.

It is understood that the staffing and operation of this facility incurs a cost to Council in its annual budget. However, the continued provision of this important service is an expense that ratepayers are willing to embrace. The MDPA identifies the Merriwa VIC as a genuine investment in the long-term economic and social viability of our wonderful town.

Any changes to the current arrangement of the VIC in Merriwa that remove or downgrade the services available would be violently opposed by this Association. Therefore, the MDPA implores the UHSC to acknowledge the value of the Merriwa VIC, and to retain its ownership and operation in its current location.




Merriwa Anglican Church



There has also been no change to the regulations regarding funerals, weddings and special functions. The locum John Marsh has also finished his time in Merriwa, finishing at the end of April, currently there is no news on when a new locum will attend at Merriwa Anglican Church.

The local community have faced the changes with renowned resilience and understanding and have adapted to the isolation well, but for those finding the situation a little tough, feel free to contact Rev Pat.
