TELL THEM FROM ME

In 2020 Merriwa Central School students from Year 4 to Year 12 will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the Tell Them From Me student feedback survey. The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. More than 6,300 schools in Australia and around the world have used Tell Them From Me to survey 5.4 million students. Capturing the voices of our students will help improve how we do things at our school.

I want to assure you that the survey is confidential. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 15th June and 3rd July 2020 (this has been moved as a result of COVID-19). Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.



For their brunch, students made clever egg and ham muffins. All the students tried them and most plates


were empty. I know that Gordie even made this recipe two times over the weekend.

In Term 2 students are learning more about Athletics. This included jumping and throwing last Friday.



Cooper remembered and wrote:


I felt happy when dad and I chased the cows to the cattle yards to put tags in their ears.





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TRINITY SUNDAY John 3:16-18

As a child I learnt about the Trinity in terms of three persons in one God – a short summary of a very complex history of debate about God, Jesus and Spirit. John's Gospel says this with much greater simplicity in the one word: 'love'. The very nature of God is to love – to reach out to another in relationship. In this conversation with Nicodemus, Jesus describes why he has come into the world; for love of us God gave the promise that those who receive this gift in faith will become children of God (John 1:12) which is this Gospel's way of describing salvation. This means of course that you and I are invited to be drawn into the very heart of God, to be drawn into the Trinity as part of God's own household.

Earlier in the conversation Jesus spoke to Nicodemus about being born again in water and Spirit – a phrase Nicodemus could not understand. The Johannine community understood that with the gift of the Spirit they were in a sense reborn into the family of God, able to call God 'Father' and each other sisters and brothers. If you want a living example of the Trinity look at a family where children participate in the life and love of their parents.

Today, as we celebrate the feast of the Trinity, we are not celebrating an esoteric doctrine from the past, we are celebrating a living relationship with God, in which we now participate. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).

Our income is totally dependent on our tourists – of which there were none – and it is imperative that we join the general trend to reopen as soon as possible. We have decided to wait for a few weeks to see what the virus will do once given more opportunities to spread, so until then we will remain shut, an opening date that could be possible is end of June 2020.

The income generated by the Centre forms an integral part of the wellbeing of our town – the Centre in the last 5 or 6 years has donated, contributed and supported organisations to the tune of over \$100,000 – not a mean feat for a "tourist shop". We have become an important part of the town infrastructure, an important part of the tourist route and an important part of the town economy, so our opening must be planned carefully, not too early and not too late.

Our plan is to perhaps just open Friday, Saturday and Sunday, 10.00am to 2.00pm to start with – the way we started 16 years ago....we go back to the beginning!

The other side of the coin is that we need goods for sale, no use opening when "the shelves are bare", so I ask each and every one of you who is into arts and crafts to consider joining our little organisation.

You will earn money and support the town – without the town support the Centre will be unable to operate.

We wish you all good health and a plentiful supply of hand lotion!

MERRIWA PARK PLANS ON DISPLAY

Draft designs for an extension to the Merriwa skate park and a new accessible toilet block and Driver Reviver annexe, have been put on display for community comment.

The improved skate park is planned to include a bowl hip, two spines, a roof top grind ledge, roll overs and roll in.

The toilet block will have four unisex toilets with basins, including an ambulant toilet and an accessible cubicle with baby change facilities.



The Driver Reviver annex will be relocated and will have a hand washing basin, security roller shutters and a covered outside aluminium bench seats and table.

The \$291,000 project is being undertaken by Upper Hunter Shire Council and is funded by the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF). It is one of 12 projects underway across the Shire.

NEW FEES FOR CASSILIS WASTE FACILITY

As of Saturday 30 May 2020, there will be fees for the disposal of waste at the Cassilis Waste Transfer Facility.

Fees for General Mixed Waste:

- \$15.50 for car/station wagon
- \$58.50 for van/ute/trailer (6x4, single axle)
- \$77.00 for dual axle trailer
- \$15.50 for mobile garbage bin

Please note: the facility will only accept payments by card/ EFTPOS.

Only general mixed waste up to the size of a dual axle trailer will be accepted, however Council is investigating the options to accept other waste including recycling in the future.

There has been a free waste service for the community of Cassilis and surrounding areas for a number of years. Unfortunately, incorrect use of the site, including illegally dumped waste, resulted in Council having to engage a contractor to supervise the facility in February 2020.

The decision to charge fees was made at the last ordinary Council meeting, after the proposal to change the services was put on public exhibition from March 4 to April 4 2020.

The fees are consistent with other waste management facilities throughout the Shire. The

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


