

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Deputy Principal's Report

ONGOING ARRANGEMENTS

Last week a Sydney school was closed for a prolonged period as a result of a positive COVID-19 test. We appreciate the ongoing support of the Merriwa community as we all work together to maintain student and staff safety, health and wellbeing. We request that any students which are unwell (which includes sore throat, runny nose, cough) do not attend school to minimise the spread of any virus. Any student who becomes unwell during the school day will be monitored in sick bay until they can be collected.

Although some restrictions have been lifted there are still a number of activities that cannot be undertaken currently and we appreciate the manner in which staff, students and parents have responded.

Social distancing of adults is still important. Social distancing is achieving by maintaining 1.5 metres distance from other people will continue at this stage. Social distancing of children at school

is not required. Please support school staff at pick up and drop off by ensuring you social distance and stand back from the exit points at a reasonable distance.

MOBILE PHONES

Students are required to hand their mobile

phones into the office before school and collect them at the conclusion of school. Student's in possession of a mobile phone will be sent by a staff member to the office to hand it in. It can be collected by the student at the end of the day.





EDROLO

Merriwa Central School uses Edrolo to support senior students. Students can access specific coursework for a range of subjects (not all subjects are available at this stage). Edrolo is an interactive online program which contains – videos identifying content for specific syllabus outcomes and quizzes to test their knowledge and build success. Year 12 students should continue to access Edrolo to assist with revision prior to their examinations. Merriwa Central School will continue to provide access to this program throughout 2020. NATIONALLY CONSISTENT COLLECTION OF DATA ON SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S OFFICE

Welcome to Week Eight of the school term. With everything that has happened in our society during the last few weeks, it seems unbelievable that it is time for another break for staff and students already.

Staff have been back in full swing now, working with Learning Intentions and Success Criteria, as per the School Improvement Plan to improve the overall learning outcomes for all. When we mean all, it is not just all of our students, but all of our teachers as well. We are all learners at St Joseph's and we are continuously on the improve.

At Tuesday's staff meeting, we worked through the first three parameters of Lyn Sharratt's book, CLARITY. Lyn is an educational researcher from Canada, whose research and implementation strategies have revolutionised the Ontario School system in Canada and has heavily influenced many schools, teachers and students across the world.

The Catholic Schools Office, last year, embarked on a series of Professional Learning sessions, incorporating Lyn's research and also having her speak with staff and leadership teams across the Diocese, in order to improve teaching and learning outcomes.

At St Joseph's, we are in the first term of really looking into the 14 Parameters of School Improvement. It was interesting that we were well on our way in terms of the parameters, it is now looking at "sharpening" the focus to further improve what we do and how we do it.

Of the 14 Parameters of School Improvement, there are three "Non-Negotiables", which Lyn states. These are:

1. Shared beliefs and understandings

- A. Each student can achieve high standards given the right time and the right support.
- B. Each teacher can teach to high standards given the right assistance.
- C. High expectations and early and ongoing intervention are essential.
- D. Teachers and administrators need to be able

to articulate what they do and why they teach the way they do (adapted from Hill & Crévola, 1999).

2. A Case management approach to learning.

Staff collect numerous pieces of educational data about children's learning. When we are working with our students, our meetings will focus more succinctly on what we can do as a whole school, to make ourselves better at what we do, in order to improve what students, learn.

3. Shared responsibility and accountability

At St Joseph's, we believe that we know and are responsible for each student in the school, not just in our classroom. This is imperative, especially in a small sized school, such as ours, that we work with the expertise of each staff member to get the best out of each of our students.

BELL TOWER UPDATE

Our Bell Tower is very close to completion. David Kirkman and his wonderful team will hopefully be putting the finishing touches on what has been an outstanding job.

We can not wait to see the finished product!

SEMESTER ONE REPORTS

It usually is about this time every semester where staff are working diligently to complete Semester One Reports for students. Due to COVID-19, NESA have given all school systems more time to collect important assessment data to accurately assess student outcomes.

Reports will look a lot different to previous years, as there has been less opportunity to assess and more disruption to class routines.

School reports will be out to parents early in Term Three.

CLASSROOM REPORTS

Having been back on deck in classrooms this last two weeks, it has been terrific to see the high standard of work being completed throughout the school.

From debating and persuasive writing skills in Stage Three to outstanding efforts in reading and Creative Arts, making birds in Stage Two and Three. There is also some excellent work in multiplication in our Stage One area and finally, our Kindergarten students, who continue to make their second transition back into school life.

"Champion Foods" are those foods that keep our bodies healthy and strong. They help us stay calm and alert and ready to learn!


These are foods that are low in sugar, salt, fat and preservatives are best for learning.



WHY ARE THESE FOODS BEST FOR LEARNING?



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REFLECTION PENTECOST 3 Matthew 10:26-33

Last week we heard calling and commissioning disciples to take on his own ministry of spreading the Good News of God's reign. Today, this episode continues as Jesus instructs them about what might happen. His words, while directed to the Twelve, are recorded by Matthew for later disciples of all times. His primary message, which we hear three times, is "Do not be afraid"!

'Right now everything is not clear, but later, after the Resurrection, it will be clearer. People will oppose you; you will be in danger and some may be killed, but never forget that God knows and cares about you – this is what matters.' With words like these Jesus encourages his disciples, and the later Christians, to keep up their courage and faith.

What encouragement would he offer us today, living here in Australia? What would Australian Christians have to be afraid of? Would living out your faith ever place you at risk? Perhaps not of being killed, but of being thought odd, old-fashioned and a bit ridiculous! How would Christian values be listened to around your lunch table at work? What issues—not just theoretically, but by acting and doing something? How are such people presented in the media? Living Christianity can still be a health hazard in a society that lives out values of secularism and materialism.

Jesus then continues – 'Declare yourself'. Where do you stand? For the reign of God or against it? Would anyone even know you are a Christian? What are you afraid of? (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).

COMMENTS CLOSED FOR DPOP

UHSC received 150 written submissions from residents on the Draft Delivery Program 2017/2018-2020/2021 and Operational Plan 2020/2021. Council is replying individually to all submissions, we appreciate your considered feedback.

Council will adopt the final Program and Plan at its ordinary meeting on 29 June 2020.

How is Council's infrastructure budget spread across the Shire?

The Shire's total population is over 14,000, with over 5,000 in Scone. Aberdeen has around 2000, while in Murrurundi and Merriwa there is less than 1000 in each. More than 5000 people live in villages and rural areas.

The capital works budget includes projects that are successful in receiving state and federal

government funding. Nearly half Council's income or revenue (42.6%) comes from operation and capital state and federal governments. General rates make up only about 10.8% of revenue.

While Council undertakes smaller Government funded projects across the shire, the larger projects funded are usually in the larger population centres, and where there are already facilities, like an airport or a saleyard. This means large grants skew how the budget appears.



Big grants for major infrastructure projects have been awarded to the Shire include the Murrurundi water pipeline (and village reticulation) and projects around Scone airport and saleyards.

Substantial state funding came from the Scone bypass, a NSW Government project. The bypass construction impacted on a number of Scone facilities including the Golf Course, White Park, Bill Rose Sports Complex and the Scone town revitalisation, the NSW Government contributed funding in these spaces.

Scone Regional Livestock Selling Centre and the Scone Regional Airport have business plans to pay off the costs to rate payers, and if things go as projected, will be better than cost neutral, actually putting funds into the Council revenue stream. These projects do not come at the expense of other towns as they are stand-alone business enterprises.

This also applies to the purchase of Campbell's Corner, though that has not been funded by Government grants – but it was a once-in-ageneration opportunity to purchase an iconic building, that we believe will prove in the long run an excellent investment and a new home for the Scone Library, fitted out using funds reserved from the sale of the old Scone Council Chambers.

FAREWELL TO THE MAYOR

On June 9, Mr Wayne Bedggood provided his resignation as Mayor and Councillor, effective immediately.

Deputy Mayor Maurice Collison is Acting Mayor in the interim.

At time of printing, Council will hold an extraordinary meeting on June 16. The Councillors will vote for the Mayor and whether to apply to the Minister for Local Government to hold a by-election for the vacancy on Council or to maintain the vacancy until the next election due by September 2021.

Residents must be in reasonably good health, not require full time nursing attention and be able to care for themselves. A doctors certificate is required as part of the ILU application process.

Applications must be with your local branch before December 1, 2020.




PUBLIC TRANSPORT BOOKLET




