A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

MISS AGNES MCRAE'S PRIVATE HOSPITAL.



Extract from the Catholic Press dated Thursday October 24,1929.

The death of Miss Agnes McRae, a well known and highly respected resident of Merriwa, occurred on Monday on the 7th inst. at her father's residence. Born at Cassilis 55 years ago, she was the eldest daughter of Mr Allan McRae and the late Mrs A McRae of "Bleak House" Merriwa. Deceased entered the nursing profession and conducted "Beauly" Private Hospital in Merriwa for 14 years, but nearly three years ago, her health began to fail, causing her to abandon her profession. For the past two years she had been practically an invalid, but bore her sufferings with patience and resignation. Article sourced by Kim Clydsdale.

The name Beauly was named after the town Inverness in Scotland where the McRae's came from. John (Jack) McRae recorded in his diary on the 1st February 1913, Mrs Telfer had a baby, the first born at Beauly. Due to illness, Agnes was unable to deliver after 1927.

The hospital consisted of a three bedroom cottage with a seperate building out the back which had two bedrooms and a kitchen. There was a connecting walkway between the two buildings. Gerard McRae and Mavis Collins were both born at Beauly as were many others who would be familiar to families around Merriwa. The house still stands down the bottom end of

Bow street as well as Bleak House on the corner and Avoca the other side of Beauly, all houses owned by the McRae family.






















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Principal's Report

SCHOOL OPERATION AND COVID

A significant number of schools in Sydney have been impacted by COVID, and temporarily closed in recent weeks. We need to continue to be vigilant and follow Department guidelines to maintain the safety of staff, students and visitors.

The Department has provided new advice to school in the last few days.

ATTENDANCE

Students should be at school unless they have a medical certificate which states that they are unable to return to school due to an ongoing medical condition and the expected timeframe. Or they are currently unwell.

In accordance with advice from NSW Health, parents and carers are reminded NOT to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms. Schools will make arrangements for students who present as unwell or have flu like symptoms to be sent home.

Students and staff with flu like symptoms will need to provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result before being permitted to return to

school. Schools are not required to conduct widespreadure screening or mandate the wearing of a mask.



GENERAL ACTIVITIES

Parents/carers and other non-essential visitors are not allowed on the school site.

All group singing (choirs) and/or other chanting activities, as well as the use of wind instruments in group settings, are not permitted.

School formals, dances, graduation or other social events are not permitted. Schools may hold a Year 12 assembly at school without parents to recognise the completion of school. Schools may consider delaying events until later in the year.

School assemblies (limited to 15 minutes and no external visitors)

P and C meetings and events must be on-line only.

ACTIVITIES ON HOLD FOR TERM 3

The following events will be reconsidered in Term 3. For now, these events must remain on hold.

- Kindergarten orientation
- Year 7 orientation has been delayed until Term 4
- Parent and carer attendance at assemblies and other school events.

SCHOOL CLEANING

Our school will continue to receive additional cleaning throughout the day in line with the AHPPC guidelines and advice from NSW Health. Target areas include high-touch areas and other hard surfaces, door handles, lockers, light switches and handrails in stairways and movement areas. There will also be additional cleaning of toilets and bubblers and topping up of supplies like soap.

TRIAL AND HSC EXAMS

Students sitting formal exams are reminded of the health warnings. If you have cold or flu like symptoms stay at home and get tested. Then

complete the illness and misadventure application process with supporting documentation.





VISUAL ARTS

This term has seen Year 11 Visual Arts exploring a range of different landscape painting styles. This has involved investigating the life and practice of the famous Sidney Nolan.

During 1946-1947 Sidney Nolan painted the "Ned Kelly series" which is regarded as one of Australia's greatest sequences of paintings of the twentieth century.

Sidney Nolanused the story of Ned Kelly as a metaphor for his own situation. Nolan was constantly avoiding the conscription



of Australia since 1942. Nolan recognised Ned Kelly's story of constantly avoiding the prosecution of his crimes from the government as one that is similar to his own situation.

Students have studied this concept of using narrative to tell a story in their art making practice to bring their own legends to life

Joanne Hamson has chosen to use the Indigenous narrative of the Min Min lights which is commonly known as an unexplained light phenomenon, using this legend to guide her subject matter she has created a two canvas design using a silhouette of a body as the main subject matter. On each canvas, one half of the body is extended across the canvas reaching to the lights. The first features a warm light with

a strong muscular hand representing the Min Min light that guides unsuspecting travellers to safety.

Second panel is the dark gloomy light that is said to lead individuals deeper and deeper into the forest and have them never seen again. This is represented by a skeleton figure reaching to the light from one side of the canvas to another.

Stacey Loft has used the Australian legend of the Bunyip which is said to be a large mythical creature in the Australian Outback featured heavily in traditional Australian Aboriginal culture. It is said to lurk in the swamps, billabongs and creeks as a water spirit taking unsuspecting victims from the water's edge. Stacey used the various depictions of the Bunyip as her inspiration to create her own depiction of the wild beast.

Well done to both girls for showing their skills in painting and creating visually appealing works using the Australian folklore as inspiration!

- When surveys are being run, you will find them under the 'Have Your Say' tab and you will be able to see and comment from this tab as well.






There are many great activities planned for students this week including making our veggie gardens, virtual excursions, experiments, cooking and a few surprises. How awesome is Science!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 500g lean beef mince
- 1 leek, white part only, sliced
- 3 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 350g jar roasted vegetables stir-through pasta sauce
- 400g can cherry tomatoes in juice
- 100g baby spinach
- 225g packet haloumi cheese, cut into 1cmthick slices
- 1/2 cup grated mozzarella
- Fresh basil leaves, to serve
- Crusty bread, to serve

METHOD

Step 1 Preheat grill on high.

Step 2 Heat oil in a large, flameproof frying pan over high heat. Add mince. Cook, breaking

up mince with a wooden spoon, for 5 minutes or until browned. Add leek, garlic and oregano. Cook, stirring, for 3 minutes or until leek softens. Add pasta sauce, tomatoes and 1/2 cup water. Bring to a simmer. Simmer for 2 minutes or until mixture thickens slightly. Stir in spinach. Remove from heat.

Step 3 Place haloumi on mince mixture. Sprinkle with mozzarella. Grill for 2 to 3 minutes or until cheese is golden. Sprinkle with basil leaves. Serve with bread.



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REFLECTION PENTECOST 12 - Matthew 16:13-20

Caesarea Philippi is in the far north of Israel at the base of Israel's highest mountain, Mt. Hermon. At the foot of the mountain there is a large cave from which issues the Jordan River.

The mountain, the cave and the river have provided a sacred site for many people. The Greek god worshipped here in the centuries before Jesus was Pan, the god of nature and fertility. The large mouth of the cave was seen as an entrance to Hades, the underworld realm of the dead. Standing before this cave, looking up at the rocky cliffs it is very clear that Jesus draws on the physical setting of this place in his words to Peter.

In this remote setting, away from the most populous villages, Jesus asks the critical question of his disciples – 'Who do you say I am?" These disciples have been with him now for some time witnessing his deeds and hearing his words. The question probes their perception and their faith. Have they grasped Jesus' identity? Simon Peter's reply indicates his growing awareness and elicits from Jesus words of commendation.

Jesus gives Simon the title 'Peter', from the Greek word 'rock' – petros. Perhaps looking at the rocky cliff-face with its dark cavern he speaks of the gates of the underworld and promises that the community founded on Peter the Rock will stand firm against the powers of death. Like a faithful steward with the house keys, Peter is given authority within the community.

What answer would you give to Jesus question? Who is Jesus to you? (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).



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


