- Sponsoring the MRLFC and many sporting clubs over the years, to name a few.


John and Andrew have also donated many hours helping the victims of the Sir Ivan Fire in the recent bushfire disaster.














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Deputy Principal's Report

During maths, students have been focusing on teen numbers and the many ways they can represent these numbers using ten frames, tallies, counters and MAB blocks.












Kindergarten have also been learning how to share objects into groups equally. They have loved engaging in sharing activities and are very quick to notice when a group is not equal!


Another highlight for the term, has been learning about concepts of music and using instruments to experiment with making sounds of varying pitch and tempo.



VACCINATIONS

The second round of immunisations will be held at Merriwa Central School on Friday September 4, 2020 (Week 7). This will be the second dose for Year 7 students, and a catch up dose for any Year 10 students who missed out on the first round in February.

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance and observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene by nurses and students
- enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health. nsw.gov.au/immunisation/ Pages/withdraw_consent.aspx.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic either as a physical card or a text message sent to the mobile number recorded on the consent form. Details about vaccinations given at school will also be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to support complete vaccination histories.

NSW Health is ensuring that students are safely vaccinated at school during COVID-19

- Information for parents/guardians

NSW Health has been working with education authorities to implement additional measures to ensure that students in Year 7 and 10 can be safely vaccinated during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Program background

In 2020 NSW Health is offering the following vaccines:

YEAR	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES		
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV)	2 doses at least 6 months apart		
	Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa)	1 dose		
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY	1 dose		

While the school vaccination program has been disrupted due to low student attendance, students are progressively returning to school over the coming months.

Additional measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance & observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene by nurses and students
- enhanced environmental cleaning of all surfaces

What parents/guardians should do

Parents/guardians should ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing). There is no need for parents/guardians who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school to take any action. Parents/guardians who have not provided consent can contact their local public health unit on 1300 066 055 or their school for advice on how to provide consent for vaccination.

When students will be vaccinated

Public health units are arranging clinics with schools so that vaccinations can be given to students as soon as possible.


FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S OFFICE

NEW COVID-19 GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOLS

Last week, a letter was sent home outlining all of the guidelines relating to schools. These guidelines are from NSW Health and are there to ensure that the second wave of COVID-19 does not strike through our state, our communities and our schools.

Here are the main points from the guidelines:

- St Joseph's Merriwa students will remain within our own school hub. There will be no mixing of students from different schools or regions
- Learning will continue to remain as normal, however, students will remain as an Infants unit and a Primary (Years 3-6) unit
- All staff professional learning is completed either at school, with social distancing, or via Zoom
- School related social activities (eg school formals, dinners or dances; graduation ceremonies; or parent engagement functions) will cease
- School related overnight events (eg retreats, camps and excursions) will cease
- Vigilance must continue to ensure that staff and students DO NOT attend school or work if they are unwell.

Students are unable to return to school until they return a negative COVID-19 result AND are symptom free

The negative COVID-19 test result MUST be produced to the school, in writing, prior to any student being allowed to return to school

- Only external providers essential to the delivery of the curriculum may continue
- Dance/drama activities will require risk assessments and a COVID-19 Safety Plan
- Regional Spelling and Maths Bees, as well as Public Speaking and Debating, have been cancelled for 2020. These will still occur within the classroom setting

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- Interschool sporting events are not permitted
- Kindergarten Transition is no longer permitted until further notice
- Assemblies may continue in their current form; however, these are limited to 15 minutes.

After the exciting news a fortnight ago that we could host our incoming Kindergarten class of 2021, we were devastated by the news that all Kindergarten Orientations were to be postponed until further notice.

We are working on a way to potentially have our Colourful Kindies transition with us. When we have received further clarification, we will pass this on.





The permanent positon of General Assistant, previously held by Mike Maleki, will be advertised towards the end of term. More details will be advertised soon.





A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE



The early years in Merriwa's history wasn't easy for the property owners before the town of Merriwa was gazetted in 1840. Supplies had to be hauled long distances on non existent roads, generally the wool clip was hauled to Morpeth to be loaded onto ships for the trip to Sydney and then on to London. Wool was unloaded and the wagons loaded with supplies to probably last twelve months and included everything from bulk tea, sugar, flour, tobacco, to large tins of coffee, curry powder, spices through to blankets, trousers, shirts, socks, boots, epsom salts, ink powder, billy cans, shears, twine, castor oil and the list just goes on and on.



Add to that, plant such as ploughs, mowing machines, saws, pumps, saddles and harness, Cooper's dip etc etc etc. None of this was available before we had a town.



After we had a town, merchants took on the job of hauling goods from far away, still with no roads, just unformed tracks which varied from year to year as floods washed out gullies and creeks that forced wagons to take different routes.

The Great Northern Railway began construction from Newcastle in 1855, reached Maitland in 1857. It reached Singleton in 1863. A major bridge had to be erected across the Hunter River and then the construction of the line continued, reaching Musclebrook as it was spelt then in 1869.

Towns grew quickly after the railway line progressed on up the valley, it certainly helped the Merriwa and Cassilis area, with wagon travel distances greatly reduced.

In June 1912, the first sod was turned for the line extension from Muswellbrook (official spelling by the Railway Department after September 1 1890) to Merriwa.

On April 26, 1915, the first section of the extension was opened to Denman and finally Merriwa had its opening on October 29, 1917.







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Comfort Corner

CHICKEN, LEEK AND MUSHROOM PIE

Ingredients

- 6 chicken thighs, skin on, bone in
- Salt flakes
- Freshly ground pepper
- Extra virgin olive oil
- 1 litre chicken stock, hot
- 1 small (or ½ larger) brown onion, finely • diced
- 3 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 2 leeks, finely sliced
- 65g butter
- 450g large pine or field mushrooms, carefully cleaned, finely diced

- 3 sprigs thyme, leaves only
- 40g plain flour
- 2 tbsp double cream
- 2 tsp heaped dijon mustard
- 1 handful flatleaf parsley, chopped
- 2 handfuls frozen peas
- 1 thick piece (about 375g) puff pastry
- 1 egg, whisked

quite thick but luscious.

8. Cut the pastry sheet three centimetres larger than your pie dish to make a pastry pie lid. Brush the edge of the dish with the egg, tip the filling in and drop the lid on, crimping to seal. Decorate with the pastry scraps. Make an incision in the top to release steam and brush with egg. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until golden and puffed.

Method

- Season the chicken thighs and brown in a little oil in a large pan over medium heat. Add the hot stock. Simmer gently for 25 minutes or until the thighs are cooked
- 2. Remove and strain the stock. Skim off most of the fat from the stock. Return the stock to the stove and reduce to about 400 millilitres
- 3. Filling: add oil to pan, cook the onion, garlic and leeks for about 10 minutes over a slow heat to caramelise and soften
- 4. Add 25 grams butter, mushrooms and the thyme and cook for a further 5 minutes. Season with salt and pepper
- 5. Preheat the oven to 190 degrees fan-forced or 210 degrees conventional
- 6. Melt remaining butter until starts to sizzle, add the flour and stir to make a roux. Cook for 1 minute, stirring all the time, then add the strained stock. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes at a simmer, whisking constantly it should be smooth and thick.
- 7. Take the sauce off the heat and leave to cool a little. Whisk in the cream and mustard, and add the mushroom mix, parsley and peas. Tear or chop the chicken and add to the mix. Combine thoroughly, and check and adjust the seasoning the mix will be

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REFLECTION PENTECOST 13 - Matthew 16:21-27

Immediately after Peter's success story, where he accurately names Jesus as the Christ, comes his failure. The word Christ is Greek for the anointed one, or in Hebrew, the Messiah. The expectation was that the Messiah would be the son of David, and like king David would triumph over Israel's enemies and win their freedom.

This is not the type of Messiah that Jesus is. Jesus' way of being the Messiah is to struggle against the oppressive spiritual powers that enslave and corrupt. This struggle will eventually take Jesus to his death. When Jesus begins to explain this, Peter remonstrates with him for Peter's idea is of a glorious and victorious Messiah. In this Peter is acting as the Tempter, Satan, who tries to lead Jesus away from his true path.

Jesus' words to Peter put him in his right place. Peter is a disciple, and the place for disciples is behind Jesus so that they can be his followers. It is not Peter's role yet to lead. So Peter is told "Get behind me" – take up the place of a follower, and stop being an obstacle in front of me.

Sometimes I act like Peter. Sometimes I find myself telling God what to do, what would be the best course of action. Like Peter I forget my place. Not only can I tell God what is best, but I then can work very hard to see that this happens! It is not easy letting God be God and dealing with the anguish of being an ordinary human being struggling with life's mysteries. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).






