A Walk Down Memory Lane



WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

CAMPBELL'S STORES IN THE UPPER HUNTER

M a I c o I m Campbell was a young Scot who came to Australia to make his fortune on the goldfields. After suffering the hardships of a digger's life in both

New South Wales and Victoria he began work in East Maitland in the stores of W and J Crockett before moving to Mudgee. Mr Malcolm Campbell married Miss Isabella Crockett in 1861.

On March 17, 1862, Malcolm purchased the business of Mr John Ferguson which was located in Sydney Street, Muswellbrook near the current Subway (Caltex) garage. Due to the dangers of flooding, in March 1869, Malcolm advertised tenders in the Maitland Mercury newspaper for the erection of a store and dwelling in Bridge Street Muswellbrook where in April 1871 he opened a grocery store. The staff then consisted of about ten hands, including Mr J W Humphries. Malcolm Campbell ceased to take an active part in the business around 1876 and went to England in 1877. He put Mr J W Humphries in charge of affairs as manager. Mr Malcolm Campbell died in 1905 aged 70 years after a prolonged illness.



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Deputy Principal's Report

TELL THEM FROM ME PARENT SURVEY

The Partners in Learning parent survey is part of the Tell Them From Me suite of surveys on student engagement. The parent survey helps to clarify and strengthen the important relationship between parent and school.

The survey is anonymous and can be used either as a one-off survey or over time, with the ability to identify trends within schools and better inform school priorities. The survey is held once a year and is run at the same time as the Focus on Learning teacher survey and the second optional student survey. Information about how to complete the Parent survey will be provided through the school app.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS FOR MY SCHOOL?

The parent survey provides school principals and school leaders with parents' perspective on their school as well as learning at home. Communication between parents and staff, activities and practices at home, and parent views on the school's support of learning and behaviour all help build an accurate and timely picture that schools can use for practical improvements.

Data reports are provided to school leaders within three business days of the survey closing. Schools will be able to access a 'one click' PDF summary report of their school's results. A summary 'radar' chart shows your school's average scores on a ten-point scale for the eight measures. The report shows a distribution of answers for each measure which allows school leaders to target specific issues. Your school's results will also be compared against state-wide norms.

This survey is currently open and will close on October 23, 2020.





NEW COVID-19 GUIDELINES FOR SCHOOLS

Last week, a letter was sent home outlining all of the guidelines relating to schools. These guidelines are from NSW Health and are there to ensure that the second wave of COVID-19 does not strike through our state, our communities and our schools.

Here are the main points from the guidelines:

- St Joseph's Merriwa students will remain within our own school hub. There will be no mixing of students from different schools or regions
- Learning will continue to remain as normal, however, students will remain as an Infants unit and a Primary (Years 3-6) unit
- All staff professional learning is completed either at school, with social distancing, or via 700m
- School related social activities (eg school formals, dinners or dances; graduation ceremonies; or parent engagement functions) will cease
- School related overnight events (eg retreats,

camps and excursions) will cease

- Vigilance must continue to ensure that staff and students DO NOT attend school or work if they are unwell.
- * Students absent or sent home due to flu like symptoms need to be tested
- * Students are unable to return to school until they return a negative COVID-19 result AND are symptom free
- * The negative COVID-19 test result MUST be produced to the school, in writing, prior to any student being allowed to return to school
- Only external providers essential to the delivery of the curriculum may continue
- Dance/drama activities will require risk assessments and a COVID-19 Safety Plan
- Regional Spelling and Maths Bees, as well as Public Speaking and Debating, have been cancelled for 2020. These will still occur within the classroom setting
- Interschool sporting events are not permitted
- Kindergarten Transition is no longer permitted until further notice
- Assemblies may continue in their current form; however, these are limited to 15 minutes.

COLOURFUL KINDIES

After the exciting news a fortnight ago that we could host our incoming Kindergarten class of 2021, we were devastated by the news that all Kindergarten Orientations were to be postponed until further notice.

We are working on a way to potentially have our Colourful Kindies transition with us. When we have received further clarification, we will pass this on.

REFLECTION PENTECOST 15 - THE TRIUMPH OF THE CROSS - John 3:13-17

During the cycle of the Liturgical year there are few Feasts that interrupt the flow – Feasts to be taken very seriously. Today we focus on the Cross as the symbol of God's victory over evil. Of course, this victory was not visible on Good Friday – this looked like the execution of a criminal. It is only in the light of the Resurrection that the cross is transformed from a symbol of horror to a sign of love unto death. 'God so loved the world'. That means you and me! And all the people in your family, your street, your office!

The Gospel also puts the Cross into the context of love, to make love known by demonstrating it. In carrying out this mission Jesus ran into opposition. Some found this too good to be true. It was an unbelievable message, so they killed the messenger. Jesus could have avoided the cross if he had changed his message, made some compromises. He kept faith with the God he knew as a God of love, and paid the ultimate price. This is Jesus' victory. He refused to surrender his fidelity; he refused to compromise his truth even in the face of torture and death. For those with eyes to see, the Cross was already a victory podium; the Resurrection confirmed this. Fidelity, integrity, love. Death, even on a cross, could not destroy these. John's Gospel expresses this victory when it speaks of Jesus being 'lifted up'. At one lever it refers to the lifting up on the Cross, but the Greek word also means 'exalted.' (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).

HAVE A GET READY WEEKEND WITH FAMILY, FRIENDS AND NEIGHBOURS

Council is encouraging everyone to use the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) Get Ready Weekend (September 19-20, 2020) to prepare for bushfire season and start a broader conversation about being aware of and prepared for all hazards.

"The 2019/20 bushfire season was the most devastating bushfire season in our State's history. It was a stark reminder of the danger of fire. It was also a reminder of the importance of being prepared and having a plan," Mayor Maurice Collison said.

Get Ready in six simple steps:

- Know your risk think about the area you're in and the types of disasters that could affect you;
- 2. Plan now for what you will do sit down and talk with your family and plan for what you will do if a disaster affects your area;
- Get your home ready prepare your home by doing general home maintenance and checking your insurance coverage;
- Be aware find out how to prepare, what to do if there is a disaster in your area and connect with NSW emergency services to stay informed;
- 5. Look out for each other share information with your family, friends, neighbours and those who may need assistance.

The results are in, no changes for Australia Day

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Council thanks everyone who took the time to share their views on Australia Day organisation.



At the ordinary Council meeting on Monday, August 31, Councillors noted the survey results, finding that celebrations should remain the same; to continue citizen awards, citizenship ceremonies, barbecues, ambassador speeches and pool parties as done in previous years. Australia Day organising committees for Aberdeen/Scone, Murrurundi and Merriwa/Cassilis will continue to be responsible for organising individual local awards ceremonies and activities and Awards will remain the same in name and quantity as in previous years, providing sufficient nominations are received.

The 400 survey responses indicated that the community favoured keeping things as they are, with 63% of respondents in support of keeping the three individual ceremonies and 54% in support of not making changes to the awards.




