# WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

James Timothy O'Keefe and Clara Christina O'Keefe (nee McDonell).

James was born on the 20th January 1879 at Tumut, NSW. He was brought up on the family property 'Wyangle' which was 6 miles out of

Tumut.

Clara Christina McDonell was born on April 6,1884 at Bombowee, NSW.

James and Clara were married in the Catholic church at Tumut in 1906, and lived 25 miles out of Tumut on their property Bondo. It was here that seven of their eight children were born.

William Thomas (Tom)

George Edward (George)

Nellie Miriam (Nell)

Clare Eileen (Bub)

Myra Phyllis (Peg)

Dorothea Theresa (Dorrie).

Hard times forced the sale of their property and James started a new career managing other peoples properties.

James came to the Hunter Valley in 1922 to work at St Heliers for J M Campbell (son of M Campbell). His two sons Tom and George came with him, leaving his wife and five children behind in Tumut. In 1923, James returned to





Tumut and brought his wife Clara and children to live at St Heliers. It was while they lived here that their last child Arthur (Artie) was born in 1925. The two eldest boys, Tom and George with their father on the property for the length of time he managed it.

St Heliers was originally settled by Lieutenant Colonel Henry Dumaresq and was eventually purchased by J M Campbell. The property was cut up and sold by Public Auction in 1929.

Harold Watts and his brother Frank each purchased a block. James' eldest daughter married Harold Watts in 1932 and so a member of the O'Keefe family went back to live in the house previously occupied by her parents and siblings.

James was offered the position as manager of a property at Cassilis owned by Mr Les Weidman, the property was called Wynola and ran sheep. The family lived there for many years and it was here that James bought a car for Artie, up until then a horse and sulky had always been the mode of transport. James never did learn to drive, Artie was always the chauffeur.


Whilst living at Wynola, most of their children were married,

# **Principal's Report**

As we all adjust to the "new normal" the Department continues to update schools on organisational and student safety matters. However the cohort most impacted by COVID has been our Year 12 students in their final year of schooling.

#### **SCHOOL YEAR EXTENDED FOR YEAR 12**

The Department has extended the school year by one week in an attempt to compensate students for lost time during the year for HSC preparation. Year 12 students would normally finish on the last Thursday of Term 3, however this has now been extended by one week which takes them through until Thursday Term 4 Week 1.

Additional HSC study days are being run by staff for selected subjects during the September school holidays. Whilst attendance is voluntary, students are encouraged to make the most of the sessions in which staff are giving up their own time during the holidays.

#### YEAR 12 GRADUATION ASSEMBLY

We are unable to run our usual Year12 assembly on the last day of school, however secondary students will mark the occasion with a scaled back version in Week 1 next term. Unfortunately parents are unable to attend this assembly due to the COVID restrictions.

#### **YEAR 12 FORMAL**

The Department updated advice to schools last week in regard to Year 12 Formals which previously had been cancelled. Farewells can now take place after the HSC exams, from November 12 onwards. Current advice limits attendance at Farewells to Year 12 students and staff, unfortunately parents are not able to attend. Given this advice has just changed we are yet to determine whether a formal under these conditions will take place for Merriwa students.

#### **HSC EXAMS**

NESA has issued updated advice to students sitting HSC exams next term with COVID safe protocols. The advice is as follows, if you are sick with flu-like symptoms (fever, cough, sore/

scratchy throat, shortness of breath, loss of taste or sense of smell) do not attend the exam, get tested and self-isolate. New COVID-19 illness and misadventure application processes have been created for students to follow. Students are encourages to check out the NESA website for more information.

Alternate venues for exams will also be arranged should the school be temporarily closed due to a positive case of COVID.

#### **GOOD NEWS**

Whilst all these changes have had a devastating impact on Year 12 celebrations all is not bleak. The P and C have proposed to cater for a special luncheon for Year 12 students in their last week of school. In the spirit of the occasion teaching staff will rise to the challenge and compete in the "student V staff" annual games.





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# St Joseph's Primary School

#### ALWAYS A LOT TO DO, IN YEARS 1 AND 2

Term 3 has been much more settled in comparison to Terms 1 and 2. Students in Stage 1 have been invested in learning a range of topics including The sacrament of Reconciliation, the Liturgical calendar, digital systems and all about weather and seasons.

Throughout the term, students in Stage One have been learning about deciphering information from images. Students have been exposed to a range of texts including Crafty Chameleon, Thursday and a selection of Jeanie Bakers fabulous picture books. These texts exposed students to a wide range of illustrations ranging from jungles, to cities to deserts. The other focus throughout Term 3 has been looking at informative texts and developing student's knowledge of the structure and key features of this text type. Additionally, Stage One have been developing an understanding of facts and opinions. This unit has allowed students to gain a deeper understanding about a range of animals including caterpillars, gorillas and the Great Pacific Octopus. Next term, students will begin to focus on persuasive texts, why these are important and lastly where these text types can usually be found.

Throughout our numeracy block this term, students have had the opportunity to engage in a variety of hands on activities. Some of these activities included a life size clock with students acting as the hands, a tower building competition for investigating the topic length, the use of playdough when investigating division

and fractions and the construction of towns and farms for the sub strand, Area.

















Religion this term, has allowed students to gain a deeper understanding of the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the Church's Liturgical Calendar. Our first weeks looked at the concept of reconciliation and it allowed students to reflect on the experience of being forgiven and forgiving others. For the remaining weeks students have been learning about the Church's liturgical year expressed through the use of different seasons, colours, symbols and practices. Students have been learning about key events and dates in the Liturgical year focused around Jesus' life.

This term, our focus for H.S.I.E has moved from history to Geography, where students' have been learning about weather, seasons and Australian places and locations. In summary, students haven and will continue to investigate the natural and human features of places. This included students learning about the weather and seasons of places. Stage One demonstrated this learning by filming a news report on their electronic devices. This news story featured a weather report for a chosen location in Australia. Students chose an interesting selection of places including scone, Adelaide and Canberra.









Onto creative arts, where Stage One have been working conscientiously with Kindergarten to create a mural around the theme 'Under the Sea'. Students began by painting the background and experimenting with a variety of textures to create the effect of moving water. Students then went on to create various types of fish, seaweed, rocks and lastly a feature dolphin and mermaid to finish off the mural.



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#### The final week of Term 3:

Week 9 already, how crazy is that! Term 3 will conclude with a Socktober event day, also known as mission day. This day is focused around the theme 'Sock it to Poverty.' Students will participate in a liturgy, followed by a range of activities arranged by Stage 3 students and finally a soccer goal shoot out using our homemade soccer balls.

#### REFLECTION PENTECOST 16 - Matthew 20:1-16

This parable always makes me feel uncomfortable since I identify with the workers who came in the morning and find myself saying "It's not fair", and then "God's not fair" - which is exactly the point of the parable. God is not fair! God doesn't measure things out according to what is deserved. God simply gives generously. In my classes when I teach this parable I have students take the various roles and then have them discuss the day later in the week. The feelings run high. Some want to work for this master again. Others aren't sure that he will act the same way in the future. It all seems very haphazard. Others want to form a union and negotiate set wages for set times. This just goes to show once again that God is not like us, or should we say, we are not like God.

Jesus begins the parable with the words "This is what the reign of God is like" (Matthew avoids the name of God and uses 'heaven'). Taking Jesus' words seriously he describes a ridiculously generous God who doesn't give what is earned or deserved but uses another criterion. God's criterion is God's own selfless love.

The concept humbles me. It's beyond my comprehension. Like most people I know I have a suspicion that I've got to earn love – human or divine. That someone could simply love me! But that is what the parable asks us to consider. The reign of God is not something we earn or deserve through our own efforts. The Kin-dom is God's gift. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM).

After many years James was offered a position by Mr Andrew Bowman to manage 'Gyarran', a property just outside Muswellbrook. James, Clara and their remaining son Artie settled into 'Gyarran'. It was while they lived at 'Gyarran', Artie married his long time love Cecilia Bull of Cassilis. In 1954, Mr Bowman informed James he was intending to sell 'Gyarran'.

James and Clara settled into a home at 28 AberdeenSt, Muswellbrook in retirement. James died in January 1965, just a few days short of his 86th birthday. Clara died in October 1968 at the age of 84.

### **Merriwa Greenthumbs**

The Merriwa Greenthumbs workshop was the 'hottest ticket' in town last week, especially if you were a keen gardener!

Fortunately in Merriwa and Cassilis there are plenty of those.

With the drought and bush fires hopefully behind us for a little while, gardeners were keen to get the soil between their fingers and discover what native species are most suited to the local landscape.

While this was a learning (and social!) session for most, the workshop was also an opportunity to promote the Greenthumbs community gardening project – growing a few trays of native seedlings, then selling them collectively with proceeds to go back into growing more trees and supporting other community projects.

Participants were quickly put to work under the watchful eye of workshop presenter and native seed specialist Paul Melehan from Upper Hunter Landcare who said he was delighted to be invited to take part in the project.

"The more people that understand the value of growing natives on their farms, gardens or in community spaces the better.

"We have become so accustomed to selecting imported species, we have forgotten the beauty, resilience and drought hardiness of natives." he said.

Paul will be back in a few weeks with a follow up session for gardeners keen to take part in the project. All materials are supplied in exchange, participants grow the seedlings to the point they are ready for sale.

You don't need a greenhouse, just a sunny spot on the verandah or back yard. People can grow one tray or lots of trays. Some may already be cultivating their own seedlings and happy to contribute a few to the cause – if so we'd love to hear from you!

Sincere thanks to Merriwa Landcare and Jenny Lee for providing the fabulous venue for the workshop and to the Merriwa Tourist Welcoming Centre for their invaluable support. The project was funded through DPI Drought Resilience Funding and supported by Upper Hunter Shire Council.

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

#### WHAT IS LITTLE ATHLETICS?

Little Athletics is a uniquely Australian modified athletics program for children from 5 to 15 years. As the name suggests, it is based upon the sport of athletics (track and field). There is a wide range of events from running, jumping, throwing and walking and events are modified to suit the age, developmental stage and ability of the children.

#### **TINY TOTS**

Children aged 3-4 (sometimes 5) will be in a group called 'Tiny Tots'. This is a modified program that is designed to develop the children's fundamental movements of running, jumping and throwing through fun and enjoyable

activities. The aim of the program is to improve the physical, social, emotional and cognitive development of children through a play-based approach that is engaging and stimulating.

NOTE: A child MUST be 3 years of age before they are able to participate in Little Athletics. Not all States run a Tiny Tots program.

#### **AGES 5-15**

All above ages are grouped into their own age brackets (Under 6, Under 12 etc.). There no standards requirements or athletes have to meet to be able to participate in Little Athletics, meaning of children ALL abilities are more welcome than to join in. These



athletes will participate in different running, jumping, throwing and walking events on a week to week basis.
