### A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

CHINESE HEADSTONE ALONGSIDE THE THE MERRIWA HISTORICAL MUSEUM



Quite a good many years ago, Mick Nutt used to sharefarm the Brindley Park back paddock adjoining Avocado road. Joe Collins was ploughing the paddock and accidently drove over a headstone in the long grass. The

headstone had Chinese inscription engraved into it, and sometime later, word around got about this old headstone which was broken and lying on the ground in pieces.


Ray Hopcraft, the works overseer for the Merriwa Shire Council, sent Nick Hiles and Ray Byfield out to retrieve the pieces and bring them back into town. Doug Russell drilled, dowelled and cemented the headstone back together. Doug's daughter, Noeleen copied the inscription and took it to the University she was attending to have the inscription deciphered. It was an ancient Chinese dialect and Noeleen had it printed out, and was mounted on the headstone under glass. Unfortunately the weather has gotten into it and is no longer readible. The headstone was placed along the western side of the museum on the corner of Bettington and Bow streets.

Many Chinese people worked for Brindley Park during the early years, however it's unknown what this man was employed as, but Chinese people were quite often employed as shepherds and it is likely he died on the site in which he was buried. It's unlikely we will ever know how he died.

I posted this story on the website: Merriwa and Cassilis: A History Of, on April 5, 2020 and Tim Burgess shared a photo of the inscription to his friend Eric Huang who was able to decipher most of what was written. Eric showed us the Chinese characters and translated for us. It reads in English Sir Chen's grave, year 1883, June. Upon these mountains and forests, Fujian Province.

On Wednesday Primary commemorated Remembrance Day with a service held at the Primary Campus. All classes created a wreath which was laid at the flags during the service.

#### **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

Primary have been learning about poetry and in particular learning about Blackout Poetry. Blackout Poetry uses a page of text from a book, website, newspaper, magazine or another poem. Students then scan the text for a word that jumps out at them. Once they circle that word, they identify other words that go with their anchor word. The poem they create does not have to have to have the same theme as the text itself. Students then circle all of the words. using arrows to direct the reader (if needed), and blackout the background with either solid colour or an image that reflects the poem. 



### **SURF LIFE SAVING**





















# **Secondary** CHEMISTRY


### **NAIDOC WEEK**

Last week students and staff spent a fabulous and very valuable week focusing on our rich and unique heritage of this land. Activities included watching a special 'Acknowledgment of Country' on Playschool, listened to, discussed and wrote about Alfred's War and listened to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

speak about their special connection to a place.



Alfred's War is a powerful story that unmasks the lack of recognition given to Australian Indigenous servicemen who returned from the WWI battle lines. Alfred was just a young man when he was injured and shipped home from France. Neither honored as a returned soldier or offered government support afforded to non-Indigenous servicemen, Alfred took up a solitary life walking the back roads – Billy tied to his swag, finding work where he could.



### Levi wrote:

Alfred went to the Great War and was injured so he had to go home. He felt sad because his thought about his friends who were killed and he wasn't recognised for his efforts.

### Skylah wrote:

Alfred went to the War when he was young and came home with a wounded leg which hurt when he walked and on cold days.

Every ANZAC Day he remembered his friends who he had fought with. Alfred would often have bad dreams about his friends being hurt in the battle fields.

It was sad that the Government didn't recognise his efforts in the war.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are culturally and spiritually connected to the land. Students explored stories from several different people in a special video and then where given the task to write about one of these stories and then to go to a place where you know yourself and this place knows you.

### Olivia wrote:

Miranda loves the land in and around Darwin. Even though she now lives in a different spot, she feels connected and at home in the Northern territory near the sea.

I feel safe and calm when I go to the State Forrest near my old house because I love to explore and hear and see nature.

During the week students learnt more about the significance of Remembrance Day, the history of ANZAC biscuits and how easy they are to make and read numerous emotional stories about war.





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#### **BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT MATRIX**

Tuesday night, we hosted parents for the first time in an official capacity since COVID-19 restrictions to explain and introduce the newly created Behaviour Matrix.

At St Joseph's, learning comes first and we aim to decrease the time lost in children's important learning due to disruptive behaviour.

In a nutshell, the Restorative Justice Triangle, was the basis for the Matrix. It now gives teachers a more streamlined process for dealing with issues which arise in the playground and the flow charts, which are placed in each classroom, give students a better understanding and a more consistent feel to rewards and consequences.

St Joseph's chooses a "reward first" stance to behaviour. We are engaging with Positive Behaviours for Learning (PB4L) lessons and protocols and have been working closely with Mr Craig Moore, behavioural specialist at the Catholic Schools Office. Each fortnight, a behaviour focus is chosen and explicitly taught by staff. We can not expect students to conform to behaviours if they do not learn what we expect, just like all academic learning.

The behaviours we have been focusing on at St Joseph's in Term Four are:

- 1. Right Place, Right Time
- 2. Be Ready to Learn
- 3. Demonstrate Self-Control (safe hands, feet and words)
- 4. Be Responsible for My Choices
- 5. Be Respectful of Other's Space

When students are seen by a staff member demonstrating these behaviours, they are rewarded with a Gotcha, move up the Learning Ladder in class and a generally given verbal praise by the staff.

Each week, our jar, which is getting more full from the wonderful behaviours students are demonstrating, comes to assembly and a prize winner is drawn.

We are also, taking a non-negotiable stance to circumstances where behaviour choices are not to the standards we set. A more consistent approach will ensure a safer and happier place for all.

We hope that all parents will support our increased stance, not only in rewarding our students who are consistently performing to high standards, but for those who require more

assistance with their behavioural choices.

In this year like no other, COVID restrictions did not stop our talented students perform for the St Joseph's community!



Peebles, whose drive, dedication and passion for the Creative Arts shines through year on year to continue to produce fantastic results and outcomes for our students.












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#### **REMEMBRANCE DAY**

### REFLECTION - CHRIST THE KING - Matthew 25:31-

The final Gospel of the liturgical year offers great insight into firstly Jesus and then Matthew's understanding of what lies at the heart of our Judeo-Christian tradition. The King in the story identifies himself with the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the sick and imprisoned. Responding to God necessarily involves our response to the needy in the world. Christianity is not simply a set of pious practices or rituals; the spiritual person is necessarily ethical.

As I write this reflecting on the past year I fear our Australian society may be found wanting in this judgement. The strangers to our shores have not been made welcome; the hungry and thirsty have not found nourishment; the sick and naked have been turned away. The Gospel of Jesus rebukes our lack of compassion. 'In so far as you neglected to do this to one of the least of these, you neglected to do it to me.'

In Matthew's infancy story the name of Mary's child is Emmanuel, 'a name which means God with us'. This final episode in Jesus' ministry continues this proclamation. God is with us in the poor and the destitute of our world. 'What you did to the least of these you did to me'. As we move into a new liturgical cycle and prepare again for the coming of the child, may we keep this Gospel image in mind so that we will truly recognize God-with-us in a naked child lying in an animal's feed bin. God comes to us among the least of this world but will God find a welcome? (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)

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


