A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE THE CONVICT CUTTING/FLAGS ROAD



Originally this road was the main road into Merriwa and was called the Government Road. Teamsters found it to be a very difficult road to haul freight to and from Merriwa and searched for an alternative route and began using various tracks along much the same route that the Golden Highway now runs.

Newspaper journalists of the day didn't have anything good to say about the Government Road and were referring to it as the Flag road in the 1870's because of a gully/waterway which had naturally occuring flat sandstone resembling flag stones on either side of the crossing. There have been attempts in recent years to have two G's in the spelling but that is not borne out in the early history records and should be, for historical reasons, spelt with one G. An interesting feature along Flags road is the old convict cutting and it is hard to learn who actually carved the cutting. History on this subject has been hard to come by. At the bottom of the cutting, where the road crossed swampy ground in wet times, timber was laid out and bolted together to form a floating deck over the swampy ground, to hold the loaded wagons crossing in wet times. The deck measured about 12 feet (4 meters) wide and about 60 or 70 yards in length. The old deck is now covered by the existing sealed road. Photo of boot showing a part of the original decking timber. Other photos show the cutting through the sandstone, now partly overgrown with vegetation.

The cutting commences 5.2 kilometres from the first cattle grid on Flags road. The sealed road skirts around the cutting, park your vehicle off to the left of the road and walk over the rise, this will bring you into the cutting. It can't be seen from your vehicle.


As the term heads into Week 7, the library is beginning to prepare for the end of year stocktake. Please return all library books to the school library in preparation for this.







Thank you to Renee and to Tash Taaffe and Heather from the Upper Hunter Shire Council for organising this opportunity.






















LONG STITCH – SUCH A GREAT WAY TO CALM YOUR ENGINE

IMPROVING OUR WRITING SKILLS

All teaching staff have been improving their teaching of writing this year through the L3 Stage 1 Professional Learning opportunities. Writing is hard and complex and knowing how to best teach and support the process is very important for student confidence and improvement.

Students have been creating information reports this term and learning about some amazing animals. The first two animals we have read about are Blue Whales and the Mountain Pygmy Possum. Our writing process is about learning to plan, record and edit our work to ensure the end result is the best piece of work possible. This process usually takes a lot of time and effort on behalf of the students but the results are worth it!

COLLECTING WATER – A SCIENCE EXPERIMENT



The results from our collecting water science experiment proved that plants do evaporate water form their leaves into the air which was then trapped inside the bag. Because the bag had been there for seven days, the water was looking rather dirty so it couldn't be drunk.

Next time we will wait just one day and see what happens. Some plants evaporate better than others.

Last week was NAIDOC week. SHPS students celebrated





REFLECTION - ADVENT 1 - Mark 13:33-37

The vestments change, the Gospel changes as the Church moves into a new cycle recalling and celebrating God's coming to our world in Jesus. This year we will hear the earliest written Gospel, that of Mark. These were years of conflict for the early Christians. The Emperor Nero had begun to persecute Christians and they were considered to be practicing a new and superstitious cult. In Palestine things were no better for there had been a Jewish uprising against Rome that had let to the destruction of Jerusalem. Mark's community was under threat and beside all these external factors, Jesus had not returned to them as they had been expecting. For forty years they had kept faith but as time passed the waiting became harder.

The Gospel speaks into this situation. Be alert. Stay awake. The Master will return. Living now, so many centuries distant from the Gospel events, these words take on a special urgency. Complacency and routine can replace alertness

and watchfulness. After such a long time perhaps we run the risk of failing to recognize the Master. Last week's Gospel revealed this difficulty. 'When did we see you hungry and thirsty, sick or naked?' 'Of course we would have welcomed you – but we didn't know it was you.' This is the alertness that we are called to; to recognize our God's coming.

As the carols ring out around the shopping centres, watch out, be alert. You never know the time when God will come to you. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)



There is not much else to report. Significant numbers of our members currently have a focus on the challenges of the harvest.


