### COVID-19

Much of the focus of the coronavirus has been in Sydney with a large Australian-Chinese population, and international travellers. Parents may be aware of one Sydney school closed last week due to the concerns.

Consistent with current guidelines, students who are unwell with respiratory illness should remain at home until symptoms resolve. # St Joseph's Primary School

Stage 1 has had a pleasant and productive start to the new school year. The term has absolutely flown by thus far with students engaged in a range of learning opportunities.

The focus for English this term has given students the opportunity to appreciate a range of non-fiction. The students have been enjoying deconstructing a number of texts regarding weather. Students have been able to enjoy a number of learning activities outside with the range of weather we have witnessed in the past few weeks. Students inquisitive minds have been stimulated in the way that they have connected their learning with further questioning and investigating. Currently students have moved into a focus on Aboriginal artwork enjoying a range or authors and artists creations. This has resulted in a deep engagement in their learning from many students, including some joining in on our weekly Aboriginal education group.

In maths we have focused on a variety of topics thus far including position, number patterns, addition and subtraction, and data. In the past week, students have produced a variety of interesting data topics which they have gathered and presented information for. Last Thursday students participated in 'No Pen Thursday' which included a Shrek karaoke activity for mathematics. Students were tasked with presenting the class votes with a variety of hands on materials such as counters. Needless to say, this activity prompted many requests for a teacher karaoke competition.

In Religion we have been learning about the kingdom of God and how this is presented throughout the bible by parables. Students have done exceptionally well to identify the hidden or underlying messages prominent in the parables studied. Starting this week, students will begin looking at the season of Lent, developing knowledge of the events of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Science has seen us learning about fair tests. This has been done by experimenting with toy cars, observing and recording what affects their speed. Following this, students created their own fair test involving planned and constructed ramps built out of a range of materials including cardboard, plastic cups, aluminium foil and

more. It has been wonderful to see students take this learning out of the classroom by putting their knowledge into home tasks.

During History, students have been eagerly learning about our school's history and their own history. For the first half of this term we have been studying the meaning of past, present and future and focusing on our own family histories. For the second half of the term we have moved into focusing on the history of our school and how it was founded in 1883.

Visual Arts has seen infants combine to create some wonderful self-portraits. Students have let their creativity shine through artworks that are anything but ordinary. Students are learning the interesting ways that artists portray their identity which has resulted in an amazing series of selfportraits.

This involved looking at Linda Kranz's story 'Only one you', followed by students designing a pebble to celebrate all the unique and wonderful qualities about themselves. The final activity of the week ended

with the creation of Breathing Buddies. This activity was a great way for parents to join in with their children to create companions for their meditation and deep breathing exercises during class time.

This year the Catholic school's week was focused around the theme 'Drawing from the well, invitation, Encounter, Witness.' ### REFLECTION LENT 3 JOHN 4:5-42

### If you only knew what God is offering

In the next three Sundays the Gospels come from John and focus on three major symbols of Easter – water, light and life. These readings are chosen to accompany the journey towards Baptism of those in the catechumenate program. In today's reading Jesus meets a woman of Samaria who represents the whole Samaritan race. There was conflict between Samaritans and Jews so it is surprising that Jesus speaks to this woman. But Jesus has come to bring all people to life in God, which is the point of this episode. Jesus invites even the Samaritans to share the gift he brings, expressed in the symbol of living water that will last forever.

This living water symbolizes the life of God. We are to be like the well with God's own life flowing within us. This is a completely new revelation to the Samaritans and to the Jews. This is why Jesus speaks of a new way of worshipping that will go beyond Israel's worship in Jerusalem and the Samaritan's worship on mount Gerazim. No one place or people has a monopoly on God. The life of God within us will enable Christians to worship in Spirit, and enter into a true relationship with God. The woman's former husbands symbolize the way people in the past tried to be in a relationship with God, but now Jesus has come to offer a new and fuller way of relating with God. From now on all people are invited to come to God in Jesus.

Are we ever aware of God's life within us? Do we ever catch a glimpse of the wonder or beauty of God? This week spend some time beside the well of your own life and acknowledge the God who dwells within. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)
