


ELIJAH BUDDEN

Elijah Budden was born in Muswellbrook 26th June, 1851, he was the son of the late Mr Elijah Budden of Muswellbrook and like his father, he followed the occupation of a saddler. He started business, firstly at Jerry's Plains and then at Denman and finally at Merriwa, where he started business as an auctioneer and stock and station agent while continuing with his saddlery business. Few men could compare

with him either as a saleman of stock and household effects. The wonder was, why a man of such brilliant talents should content himself in such a quiet country town, but Elijah could not disassociate himself from those noble institutions he helped to build on. He was a





SCHOOLS MERINO WETHER CHALLENGE

Merriwa Central School Agriculture students have gained practical hands-on sheep management experience takina part in the 2021 School Merino Wether Challenge.

Students from 65 Schools across NSW were responsible for looking after teams of Merino wethers for six months in preparation for judging that took place earlier this month.

The 2021 School Merino Wether Challenge in NSW is the biggest one yet of this annual competition organised by the NSW Stud Merino Breeders' Association, with support from AWI. The initiative aims to educate and engage students on the commercial production of Merino sheep by giving them a memorable 'hands on' experience covering a broad range of sheep and wool production skills.



This year's NSW School Merino Wether Challenge kicked off in March at a training day with industry leaders at the Dubbo Rural Skills Centre, attended by more than 300 students from 65 schools across the state. Students undertook mini workshops on topics including agricultural careers, sheep selection using measured and visual appraisal, animal husbandry, nutritional requirements, sheep and wool handling and

judging, and the profit drivers in Merino sheep production. Each school team collected six Merino wethers from the day which they took back to school and looked after for six months.

Students' efforts were judged according to the meat and wool quality of the flock. In particular, the teams were assessed and four awards presented for:

- The team with the highest estimated earning capability over a five-year period from both meat and wool.
- The team with the highest commercial wool value. The wethers were shorn during the competition, where fleeces were weighed and valued.
- The team with the highest commercial meat value.
- The overall champion team. Points were also awarded based on the students' sheep handling, dress and presentation and knowledge of the Merino industry.

Merriwa Central placed 3rd in Combined Value Award for the Tablelands Region, 4th in both the Carcase Value and Restocker categories placing



our School 9th overall. One of our wethers was also ranked 1st place for the Restocker Section.

Ms Tara Jane, Merriwa Central Agriculture Teacher, says that "Students got a lot out of participating in this program, from learning

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about sheep dietary requirements, handling, health and shearing"

"As well as showcasing the Merino breed, it encourages the students to extend their knowledge in, and potentially pursue a career within the Merino industry", said Ms Jane.


TARSHA - UNICORN SCHOOL



MATHS



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WHAT HAS BEEN HAPPENING IN STAGE 2 SO FAR IN TERM 4

It has been wonderful to be back face-to-face learning as a class in Stage 2. We have had a busy but very productive first few weeks of term.

In Religion, we have been learning about the Christian Scriptures. Students have been exploring the structure of the Bible, specifically the New Testament and the books within it.

Stage 2 have been thoroughly engaged within our math groups warmups, revising but also extending upon each strand of maths 20 minutes. So far in Maths this term, we have looked further into money, adding up amounts and most importantly working out how to give the correct change. We thoroughly enjoyed using our budgets to purchase some goodies from Infants shops they had set up for us. Students have also extended upon their multiplication and division skills from earlier this year through some game-based activities.

Our English learning this term conveniently links with our Geography unit on the Great Barrier Reef. This has been a class favourite. Students are engaged and have lots of questions to ask about the reef. They are also very interested in learning more about the threats to the reef and what we can do to help protect it. Stage 2 have been practising their public speaking skills by writing a speech on Turtles and the importance of stopping ocean pollution to protect them. In reading groups, students are reading, viewing and responding to familiar texts and justifying ideas, information and events using a range of skills and strategies. We have also spent some time on questioning to clarify understanding.

In Science, we are looking at erosion and its effects on the environment. Students will investigate how erosion is caused by human activity and identify how erosion can be minimised through research.

Since returning to school we have been full speed ahead on practising our dance and script for our annual school play. Students have been eagerly adding expression, gestures and actions to their lines convey their characters. We are looking forward to bringing our characters to life in the coming weeks by adding costumes and props.

Students at St Joseph's are fortunate to have the very talented Nicky Western back to work with them again. Nicky is teaching the students gymnastics. They are learning and developing skills, movements and techniques. The students always give their best go and enjoy learning new things.

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REFLECTION - PENTECOST 22 - Mark 10:46-52

This episode concludes a very significant section of Mark's Gospel, which began with the healing of a blind man in Bethsaida (8:22-26). In between these two miracles where blind people gain sight, Jesus has been trying to lead his disciples to an understanding of his mission. He has taught them three times about what awaits him in Jerusalem, and each time the disciples fail to perceive his meaning. He has taught them about letting go the desire for wealth and to seek the gift that only God can give, namely life in God's presence. But the disciples have argued about who will be the greatest and who will have positions of authority.

Blind Bartimaeus models what discipleship entails. In his poverty he calls out to Jesus knowing that only Jesus can give him what truly desires. When he is healed, he leaves everything behind to follow Jesus even to the Cross.

The Gospel describes Bartimaeus as sitting by 'the way', and at the end of the story he follows Jesus 'on the way'. This term, 'the Way', appears to be one of the earliest terms for the Church – the followers of the Way. Where the disciples are blinded by their ambitions, Bartimaeus sees clearly and he willingly takes up the position of a disciple – a follower on the way.

Bartimaeus is able to name his deepest need and seek the one who can filful this. Can I leave aside the external trappings that can distract me from following my heart's desire? (From 'Sundays Under the Southern Cross' by Mary Coloe PBVM)



Wellbeing Superspreaders

Just in case anyone needs any more reasons to join our Merriwa Wellbeing Superspreaders participate in Mental Health First Aid training next month, here's a few words from Merriwa farmer and former school teacher Heidi Inder who did the course a couple of years ago:

"Mental illness touches everyone's lives, whether it's through family or friends, and the more understanding, education and tools we have to identify it and manage it and support other people it's just go to be a good thing. In the past there's been a big stigma with mental health issues but education strips it away.

"During the Mental Health First Aid course we learnt strategies to look after ourselves as well as how to support people around you who may have some mental health issue. It just makes you more aware of what the subtle things might be – they mightn't be saying it directly but it helps you identify other things that might be a sign of a mental health issue.

"We also learnt about strategies to manage our own stress levels because if you're not well, you can't help anyone else. You've really got to look after yourself, and for a lot of us as mothers we don't tend to do that and we put ourselves last."



Importantly, Heidi says the course made her much more aware of the services available.

"For people in rural areas like ours support is so much

more accessible for now than what it was 10-20 years ago. There are so many online services and telehealth and apps that I wasn't aware of before doing the course."

A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

noble worker in the cause of charity, for many years, a member of the hospital committee, a firm supporter of the School of Arts, always in front, always progressive and a member of the Church of England. He was one of natures ideal men, one that practised what he preached, he was a leading spirit in all matters of sport and few men could be found to compare with him in the masterful way of controlling not only the juveniles but the trained athletes.

He married Isabella Brodie on 18th June 1873 at Mudgee. He died 8th September 1912 and left his wife, Isabella, five sons and two daughters. A son Augustus Victor(Vic) Budden continued on a saddlery business in the town.

A news article, dated February 1913, it was proposed to raise a memorial to the late Mr Elijah Budden at Merriwa and an article later that year in the Mudgee Guardian, dated 4th September 1913, read "The Budden Memorial Committee have just had a lamp erected at the corner of Bettington street. It is a fine lamp and stands on a stone and concrete base with a marble tablet inset, bearing the inscription "Erected to the memory of Elijah Budden by the citizens of Merriwa and dated 1913.
