SANDY HOLLOW TO ULAN RAILWAY PART 2



Continuing on from last weeks Sandy Hollow to Ulan rail line, the reason for the line, the Ulan Coal mine.

It appears that coal was first discovered at Ulan in the early 20th century at the outlet of a wombat hole but nothing was done about exploration until early 1919. Not a great deal happened, with some coal being mined for local use. Mudgee, from 1920's to 1930's had a fairly large gasworks and this gasworks kept the mine going for some considerable time. In the 1950's, the coal leases were sold to Ulan County Council to utilise Ulan coal. The Electricity Commission took over and built the power station and called for tenders in the 1950's to supply 50 tons a day and was signed on February 2, 1956.

In 1976, the new owners of the Ulan Coal mine completed an exploration programme which confirmed the mines potential to supply the export market with hih quality coal. Further studies indicated that the proven reserves would be best exploited by a combination of open cut mining methods and treatment in a coal





preparation plant.

However, transportation to the coast would not be economical using the existing rail route from Gulgong to Newcastle via Werris Creek, and so the developers proposal to recommence construction of the abandoned Ulan to Muswellbrook route in principal by the NSW Government in 1980.

From the commencement of work on the rail line and then the mine opening, people from the Merriwa district have found employment with people like the Houlahan's on the rail line in the early days through to the later works, Paul Fitzpatrick was contracted to supply fuel along the line because of his smaller vehicle, larger vehicles were'nt able to reach some of the sites. The Nutts had trucks hauling coal at Ulan. The mine employs workers from this area so over the



RURAL YOUTH AMBASSADOR PROGRAM

On April 25, I went to Sydney as a Rural Youth Ambassador. The Rural youth Ambassadors are run by Rural Inspire, and their ultimate goal is to provide opportunities to young people in Rural areas. We were the first NSW Rural Youth Ambassadors and all of us come from Rural towns within NSW. The Victorian program has been running for over 10 years. The goal for us Rural youth Ambassadors, however, was to bring light to rural issues within schools and solutions to these issues.



Since June of last year, we identified four issues within rural schools: Teacher retention, Mental health, Opportunities within schools, and life after school. During our time in Sydney we saw a range of politicians and programs for young people, some of which had worked in our community such as the COVID Tutoring. We saw a range of Bureaucrat and the Australian Business and Community Network, and even Minister of Education for NSW, Sarah Mitchell, Although I don't have to time to expand on our solutions in-depth, rest assured that this program was truly valuable. I can't believe I actually ad the opportunity to make a difference and explore what it's like to be a young person in a rural area, with people who can make the changes needed. My peers and I will treasure this opportunity for years to come.

One day hope to have the opportunity to be an Alumni and provide the support the program needs to keep running. Trigonometry comes into play when you start to look at capacitance and magnetism.

HERE'S A CLUE ABOUT YEARS 1 AND 2

It has already been a busy but productive start back to Term 2 in Stage One. This term students will be engaged in a range of classroom learning activities as well as a number of whole school events including, our school athletics carnival, the initial planning of our 2021 school play, Catholic Schools week, Reconciliation week, Vinnies Day and School Camp draft and Fete.

Our English studies have been focused on informative texts. Students have been developing their knowledge of the difference between real and make-believe and between a fact and an opinion. During this term, students will have a large focus on vowel diagraphs (2 letters, making one sound) though explicit phonics instruction. Explicit phonics instruction is important for students learning to read, decode texts and when writing their own texts.


So far in Maths this term, we have learnt about whole number, and 3D objects. Students thoroughly enjoyed learning about both of these topics by engaging in hands on activities. Last week students finished off their maths by using a range of materials including playdough, Lego and magnets, to build and explore 3D objects and their properties. This week students will be learning about addition and subtraction, specifically how to use a range of strategies to solve questions and word problems.



In religion, students have begun about learning the Jewish people and their special relationship with God. They have and will continue to learn about ways that the Hebrew Scriptures

describes God's presence in the lives of people who lived at the time. Following this, Stage One will begin to develop their knowledge and understanding of the Catholic Sacraments. This will be focused on learning about Baptism, the initial Sacrament of Initiation into the Church community.

In Stage 1 students have been investigating how materials can be changed, manipulated and combined. Students will follow the design process to create objects by manipulating and combining materials. The students will make predictions and observe and record their results.







Years 1 and 2 are examining how the present, past and future are signified by terms indicating time such as 'a long time', 'then and now', 'now and then', 'old and new', 'tomorrow', as well as by dates and changes that may have personal significance, such as birthdays, celebrations and seasons. Students will identify days, holidays, events celebrated by other students and their families. They will explore and experience cultural differences in the days celebrated.

Infants have been busy working together to create dramatic plays using sculptures as the characters. After reading the text, Possum Magic by Mem Fox, students created sculptures representing either an Australian animal or an Australian food.

Last Friday, our school celebrated St Joseph's the Worker Day. Parents, carers, friends and the wider community were invited in to an open day. CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK – 200 YEARS OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION

This week is Catholic Schools Week throughout Australia. We celebrate 200 years of Catholic Education in Australia. Catholic Education is celebrating 200 years in Australia, marking the bicentenary of the first Catholic school established in Parramatta in October 1820. The first Catholic school in Australia was founded in October 1820 by Irish Catholic priest Fr John Therry and run by convict and lay person George Marley. The school, which Catholic historians believe was in Hunter Street, Parramatta, taught 31 students. By 1833, there were 10 Catholic schools in the colony. Over 200 years, Catholic schools have arown to become the largest provider of schooling in Australia (outside government) with one in five school age students attending a Catholic school. This represents 777,000 students in 1,755 schools across the country and employing over 100,000 teachers and staff. We are privileged to be, but a small yet significant part of the history of Catholic Education in Australia.



Both Ben and Gordie loved the walk up Split Rock and meeting new people. Cassilis looks forward to attending the camp again in 2022.



















ZONE CROSS COUNTRY



REFLECTION - EASTER 6 - John 15:9-17

Last week gave us the image of a vine to express the intimacy between Jesus and his disciples. This week, Jesus draws on the image of a family to speak of his relationship with God as a father. Because this is such familiar language, we can forget that it is such familiar language, and we can forget that it is in fact an image. God is not a father, nor a vine-keeper, nor a shepherd. These are images drawn from life-experience to try to speak about God in says familiar to our human experience.

The close love between a parent and child is the love Jesus says exist between himself and his disciples. Later he speaks of them as friends. There is in this passage a progression of relationships: God loves Jesus who loves disciples who are to love one another. The measuring stick for our relationship with God is our relationship with each other. Christians cannot draw into a pious cosy 'me and God' duet. Being at home with God requires that we open ourselves to be at home with others. Not an easy task!

Here is a saying 'absence makes the heart grow fonder' and this can be true

For God. It's easier to love the 'absent' God in a distant heaven than to love

God in our faimlies, or workplaces or living in our streets. 'Love one another, as I have loved you'. Jesus loved to the point of giving his life. What are we asked to give to another – a listening ear, an hour of our time, a card or letter, a visit? 'What I command you is to love one another'. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)


2021 IS THE CENTENARY YEAR OF ROTARY IN AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND.

Prep Time: 5 minutes

Chilling time: 3 hours

Ingredients

- 395 g tin sweetened condensed milk
- 375 g milk chocolate
- 200 g Tim Tams roughly chopped

Instructions - Microwave Method

- 1. Grease and line a 20cm X 20cm square baking tin with greaseproof baking paper and set aside
- 2. Place the sweetened condensed milk and chocolate melts into a microwave safe bowl
- Heat on 50% power in 30 second bursts, stirring each time with a dry metal spoon until just melted (this will take approximately 1-2 minutes)
- 4. Working quickly, stir through the chopped Tim Tams
- 5. Pour into the prepared tin and place into the fridge for 2-3 hours to set
- 6. Cut into small slices and serve.

MERRIWA TO WILLOW TREE ROAD - TRAFFIC OFFENCES

The MR358 Merriwa to Willow Tree Road has been closed to all traffic since January 21 2021 due to the current risk of landslip in some sections, with signs of movement including cracking observed in both lanes which has continued to worsen.
