

MERRIWA CHILDREN TRAVEL 90 MILES TO SCHOOL

"Some children in the Merriwa district travel 90 miles per day to school" Said Mr John Shannon when outlining the history of Merriwa at the opening of a new classroom block in Merriwa on Sunday November 19, 1961.

His Lordship Bishop John Toohey blessed and opened the new block of two new classrooms which were built at a cost of £8,500. Merriwa which is situated in the Western Extremity of the Hunter Valley, about 130 miles from Newcastle.

The first catholic school in Merriwa was built almost eighty years ago, a humble slab building. After the St Joseph sisters were established at Lochinvar in 1883, the first branch convent they opened was at Merriwa. Father O'Reilly was the parish priest and with that indomitable drive we have come to associate with the early pioneer priests, he did not rest until he had a convent established and a Catholic school in his parish.

A modern school was built in about 1924 by Rev. Father Ward and it was a modern school, for even in 1924, it had central heating. In 1954, a modern kindergarten was built during Rev.

200 CHILDREN TRAVELLING


One of the reasons why there is a need for the extra school accommadation is the modern means of transport and subsidised fares. Every morning, over 200 children arrive in Merriwa by bus to go to school, some to the Catholic school, some to Merriwa Central School. Some of these children travel up to 90 miles each day (45 miles each way).

They come from Idaville, Springfield, Collaroy, Gungal and the Willow Tree road districts.



The artwork includes communities, people, animals and bush medicines spread over different landscapes of red dirt, green grass, bush land and coastal areas to tell the story of the many ways Country can and has healed us throughout our lives and journeys.

Infants students travelled through space, exploring and learning all about the solar system. They were very excited to use "magic space paper" to project planets and other space matter onto. Arguably, the most popular primary rotation, was the planetarium escape room. Students were "locked" in the classroom and had to solve clues to find the correct combination in order to escape. They used flashlights to locate and read posters around the room with information all about space. It was a very fun and exciting way to learn more about space!

Students finished their day by watching a space movie with their class. It was a memorable day and students are to be commended on their enthusiasm and exceptional teamwork.



Thank you to Cate Horton for coming along and helping the students and to the P and C for providing a delicious chicken burger which went down a treat after our great exercise in the fresh air.



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

REFLECTION - PENTECOST 5 - Mark 5:21-43

What strikes us about Jesus in this reading is his willingness to help those who are in need of his help. He is always sensitive to where people are and to what they need and is most practical in his concern for us. If you wish to dwell with Jesus being like this for you now, you might let him be tuned to where you are in a sensitive way. Likewise you might allow yourself to be with Him as one who is attuned to your needs and does not impose his desires on you.

Perhaps you are suffering right now - burning with anger at someone who has hurt you or unable to forgive an old hurt, or you are a bit depressed.

Talk with the woman who has been in pain for twelve years. Listen to her tell you to touch Jesus' cloak. Imagine doing that. This is not magic but a meeting with Jesus and asking for his help, the thing God carries its own healing power. Prayer can often feel like touching the hem of Jesus' garment, but it is authentic when, like the woman, you tell the Lord the whole truth. In many ways it may surprise you. 

MERRIWA LANDCARE AND GREEN THUMBS



BUILDING UPGRADES FOR AIRPORT

Modifications to the development application for the Hunter Warbirds aviation attraction were approved at the extraordinary council meeting on 8 June.

The modifications include:

 The installation of two, 480 kilolitre colorbond steel water tanks, with a diameter of 7.50 metres and height of 12.5 metres to service the fire suppression system.

Construction of an ancillary pump room.

Upper Hunter Shire Council, Mayor Maurice Collison said the design scope for the building had to be changed, in order to meet fire safety regulations.

Most museums and aviation centres have static displays of aircraft which are not operational.

"To set our facility apart from others and create a real point of difference, we decided to have fully operational aircraft in our facility. That means that the aircraft that are on display can be wheeled out and flown for joy flights," Mayor Collison said.

"This will be a unique feature of the Hunter Warbird facility. This though requires additional fire suppression and this week we approved the change in the development application to make this a reality," he said.

The alternative option would have been to bleed the aircraft of fuel each time, they went back into the centre and then refuel them each time they were deployed for a joy flight.

This would not have been a workable solution both logistically and in terms of the potential damage that this practice could do to the engines of vintage aircraft.

The construction remains within the approved budget.

HUNTER LLS FUNDS AUSTRALIAN FIRST CULTURAL BURN TRAINING PROGRAM

The first of 13 Cultural Burns planned for the Hunter region in 2021 are underway, as part of an Australian first training program to help build knowledge, skills they already have and share understanding of traditional burning and land management practices.

Hunter Local Land Services is supporting Tocal College in developing a Certificate III, IV and Diploma in Conservation and Ecosystem Management, Cultural Burn, in partnership with Firesticks Alliance.

The pilot course is the first tertiary qualified Cultural Burn course to be conducted in Australia. The course teaches Aboriginal land management students in both Aboriginal Fire Knowledge Practices and Western Science to understand the positive ecological impacts of cultural burning and Aboriginal land management practices focussing on Traditional fire management practices and techniques. In the recently commenced pilot there are 30 students enrolled, who come from a diverse range of employment and community backgrounds.

Hunter Local Land Services Aboriginal Community Officer Toby Whaleboat said the course could not have been developed or proceed without the support of local Elders and community, especially allowing the students to work on Country.

"We are so grateful to be working with Traditional owners, our community and Local Aboriginal Councils in the Hunter and Manning Great Lakes, as well as our training partners to deliver this unique course," said Toby Whaleboat.

"The students will get access to some of the best teachers in the country, including Victor Steffensen from Firesticks Alliance, combined with local knowledge passed on through Elders here in our region.

"We're hoping this pilot course could become the model for teaching Cultural Burning knowledge in a formal land management capacity across Australia."

The Cultural Burn Training will be conducted in various vegetation and ecosystems from the coast (Coastal heath) to Box-Gum Grassy Woodlands and open grassy woodlands in the west of the Hunter and will be conducted on high elevated areas such as Mount Sugar Loaf.

Each of the burns is being held on different types of land tenures from Travelling Stock Reserves to privately held properties, teaching the students how to apply the correct fire knowledge to specific types of vegetation to achieve the best outcomes for the landscape.

Monitoring plans will be developed and established to capture data prior to each burn and after each burn.

"One of the major outcomes of our cultural burning program is to offer opportunities for connection to Country for local Aboriginal student and communities, and the opportunity to share cultural knowledge on caring for Country," said Toby.

It's hoped outcomes will include reducing weed infestations, improving the health, function of native vegetation communities, protecting habitat for native animals, and reducing the risks of wildfires, promoting resilient landscapes.


Carl McNamara's two children travel 90 miles per day. The cost of this thirst for knowledge varies from 7/6 per week per family to almost £1/10/per family per week.

After his Lordship, Bishop Toohey had blessed and opened the new building, the five senior parishioners hoisted the Australian Flag while 'Advance Australia Fair' was played. The five men, Alan McRae, Stephen Costigan, Edmund Nixon, Michael McNamara and James Murray have all seen the Catholic school at Merriwa grow from a slab hut down in the town opposite the Post Office to the three gracious buildings so beautifully situated on the spacious plot of over eight acres of grassy slopes beside the town.

During the Blessing Ceremony, the Bishop was assisted by Father Delaney, the present Priest-in-charge and by Rev. Father W. Cantwell, a former Rector of Merriwa.

Since this article was written, we have found a few mistakes, the older classrooms were built in 1928, not 1924 and the first Catholic school was erected opposite the Post Office in 1858.
