SIR FREDERICK DUNCAN MCMASTER AND DALKEITH PART 1

Dalkeith was established by Duncan McIntyre in 1834 and was later sold to Robet and Helenus Scott. The Scott brothers were badly affected by the 1840's Depression which led to Dalkeith being leased and then sold to William and Alexander Busby. In 1890, Dalkeith was sold to Duncan McMaster.

Sir Frederick Duncan McMaster was born July 9, 1873 at Surry Hills, Sydney. Leaving Sydney Grammer in 1891, he took over the management of Dalkeith Station, purchased for him by his father and in 1899, assumed ownership. On November 20, 1901, Frederick married Muriel Evelyn Clara Sherlock, daughter of Cooma pastoralist T J Sherlock of Kia-ora station. They had two children, Ian and Thelma. Sir Frederick died at Dalkeith on November 28,1954.



Sir Frederick was a councilmember and later vice president of the NSW Sheepbreeders Association and an honorary life-member of the Royal Agricultural Society of England from 1943. In an address to the Sheepbreeders Association in 1929, Prime Minister Stanley Bruce challenged graziers to share with the government, the burgeoning cost of rural research. A few weeks later, McMaster, a foundation member of the State committee of the Commonwealth Council and Industrial and Industrial Research from 1926, gave £20,000 to build an animal health research laboratory in the grounds of the University of Sydney, the Commonwealth government meeting the cost of staff and equipment through CSIR. The F D McMaster Animal Health Laboratory was opened in August 1931. McMaster also assisted in the provision of field facilities for the laboratory. He was Knighted in 1934.



You will be considered an elite athlete if during your HSC year or equivalent, you were an outstanding Australian state and/or representative in a sport recognised by Sport Australia AND your selection to participate significantly and adversely impacted your HSC preparation or equivalent.

You will be considered an elite performer if you performed in extended or significant productions that significantly and adversely impacted your HSC preparation or equivalent.

Your eligibility will also be assessed on the following:

- Time away from studies devoted to competition/performances during your HSC (or equivalent) which have significantly affected your studies
- The nature of the competition/performance i.e. representation at state, national, or international level during HSC (or equivalent) or during other relevant studies
- Membership of an institute or academy of sport or member of any performing arts associations/institutes
- The number of students competing for entry into and the number of places available under the degree program

People in our community have often asked why we have Grandparents Day at the end of July. Pope Francis has now officially acknowledged what we have known for some time at St Joseph's.

Pope Francis announced earlier this year the inaugural World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which will be commemorated on July 25 around the feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus, each year.

In his message for the World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly, with the theme "I am with you always", Pope Francis said older people, even if "energy is running out", have a "renewed vocation".

"It makes no difference how old you are, whether you still work or not, whether you are alone or have a family, whether you became a grandmother or grandfather at a young age or later, whether you are still independent or need assistance," he wrote.

"Because there is no retirement age from the work of proclaiming the Gospel and handing down traditions to your grandchildren. You just need to set out and undertake something new."

REFLECTION - PENTECOST 10 – Mark 9:2-10

In ancient times mountains were considered places where one could experience the divine since they were close to the heavens. It is likely that Jesus climbed Mt. Hermon since this incident takes place soon after Peter's confession at Ceasarea Philippi which is on the lower slopes of Mt. Hermon. This is the highest mountain in Israel, and is usually snow-capped. On this high mountain, perhaps surrounded by glistening snow, Jesus experiences again his close relationship with God. He knows himself to be 'my Son, the Beloved'. The appearance of Moses and Elijah adds to the revelatory character of the scene as both of these prophets experienced God on a mountain.

Just prior to this scene Jesus was asking his disciples 'Who do people say I am?'

The disciples respond with names from Israel's past – 'Some say Elijah, some say one of the prophets.' The issue of Jesus' identity lies behind this dialogue. In the Gospel of the Transfiguration his identity is clarified – Jesus is not Elijah, nor a prophet like Moses – he is the beloved Son of God. In this scene he seems closer to heaven than to Earth and his appearance takes on divine radiance. But notice that this moment of glory is soon followed by the reality of his approaching death. Jesus lives his life within the rhythm of glory and suffering which will be manifest at Easter. This same rhythm is the pattern of all

Christian lives. We too have mountain moments of glimpsing the rich beauty of God, but we too must descend to the reality of life where suffering may await. But we descend with the assurance of being God's Beloved. (From 'Sundays Under the Southern Cross' by Mary Coloe PBVM)

THE ROTARY 100 DOWN UNDER PEACE POLE PROJECT

This is a peace project, celebrating the 100 years since Rotary was established in Australia in 1921. The project began in Canberra at the Rotary Club of Canberra Burley Griffin as the club donated a Peace Pole to a primary school in their area. Currently 126 Peace Poles have been reserved by Rotary Clubs around Australia. The number of Peace Poles which can be donated as part of the project is unlimited.

The Peace Poles bear the Universal Peace Message, "May Peace Prevail on Earth." The pole and the message symbolise our common wish for a World at Peace. They stand as a silent vigil for peace, reminding us to think and act in the spirit of peace.

The peace message is written in four languages one on each side of a Peace Pole. Each school is invited to participate by its local Rotary Club

The schools select the four languages to be used on their Peace Pole, based on the language usage of each school, with schools determining the location of the Peace Poles on their grounds.. The cost of the poles delivered to Merriwa/Cassilis is approximately \$250.00.

Once a pole has been installed, the school is invited to participate in the United Nations World Peace Day., when the words are recited in the four languages which the school has chosen for its pole. Some schools ask the local Rotary Club to send a member to deliver the keynote message from the Secretary General of United Nations to the school.

A Walk Down Memory Lane WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

In November 1954, McMaster made a further gift of £50,000 to the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation to add a wing to the McMaster laboratory in memory of his son, Ian Frederick, who in 1942, was killed in the Battle of El-Alamein in the Second World War.

His generosity was also frequently demonstrated in less public ways. In 1930, he gave 500 stud rams to the State government to distribute to needy settlers. On his death, his estate was valued for probate at £216,403 for eventual bequest to CSIRO. He was survived by his wife, Lady McMaster and an unmarried daughter, Thelma, who founded a Hereford stud at Dalkeith and managed the property until she died in 1981.

NSW GOVERNMENT FUTURE OF GAS STATEMENT

Upper Hunter Shire Council welcomes the NSW Government's decision outlined in the Future of Gas Statement to not renew the expired petroleum exploration licenses [PELs] within the shire and the prohibition of any future gasfield development in the Upper Hunter.

Council's vision is 'A Quality Rural Lifestyle in a Vibrant, Caring and Sustainable Community,' and supporting this vision Council has a longstanding and resolved opposition to both Coal mining and Coal Seam Gas [CSG] exploration and extraction within the Shire.

"The protection of our prime agricultural land, our diverse agricultural industries and the precious water resources they rely upon was the guiding principle behind Council's long held opposition to CSG exploration and extraction within the shire." Mayor Collison said. "I am glad NSW Government's Future of Gas Statement aligns with this vision."

Deputy Mayor Cr Kiwa Fisher adds, "I'm pleased Council's longstanding advocacy and resolve with regard to Coal Seam Gas has finally been successful. This is a win and a relief."

Although Council recognises it is not the consent authority for mining or CSG developments, Council will continue to advocate on behalf of the community to ensure the future of all sustainable industries, especially agriculture, that support and grow our unique reputation and identity.

FUNDING SECURED FOR NEW CYCLE AND WALKWAY IN MERRIWA

Upper Hunter Shire Council has secured \$922,674 for a new cycle and walkway in Merriwa under Stage 2 of the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, co-funded by the Australian and NSW Government.

The project will see approximately 4 km of cycle and walkway paths constructed within the town.

Upper Hunter Shire Mayor, Maurice Collison said the project will be an asset to the Merriwa community.

"The new pathways will link up with existing paths to the town's sporting facilities including the recently completed skate park. The path will also incorporate Merriwa's existing River Walk," Cr Collison said.

"We are pleased to have secured funding for this project as it will make a real difference to the community. It will improve connectivity of the town and provide opportunities for exercise and community building.

"The paths will also be a great attraction for tourists passing by. Visitors who stop at the Merriwa Driver Reviver can utilise the walkway and spend more time in the town, which will benefit local businesses," Cr Collison said.

The project is one of 195 that have been allocated funding in the latest round of the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, which is part of the \$4.5 billion overarching bushfire support program co-funded by the Australian and NSW Governments for bushfire recovery, response and preparedness in NSW.

Through the Stage 2 BLER Fund, \$283 million has been committed to local community projects supporting economic or social recovery, strengthening resilience and delivering ongoing community benefit.

Community consultation will be undertaken on the final design of the project which is yet to be determined.

Julia 'The Dynamo' Hardy


Grandmother of nine, Landcare chief, Little Athletics coach, yoga practitioner and walking.
