A Walk Down Memory Lane WITH JAMES CONSTABLE



SIR FREDERICK DUNCAN MCMASTER AND DALKEITH PART 2

After taking over management of Dalkeith in 1891 and assuming the ownership in 1899, Sir Frederick set about improving the property and it's sheep. He later introduced Peppin blood to the flock. In 1911, McMaster bought 'Comedy King', the Boonoke exhibition ram for 800 guineas and later that year acquired 'Australia Day'. Only one season of use was obtained from 'Comedy King', owing to his coming to an untimely end through blood poisoning. As important as these purchases were, the purchase from the Messrs Falkiner of Boonoke stud of 1,000 four year old ewes, selected from the drop of their year by Mr Otway Falkiner himself. 150 of the best ewes to form the foundation of the proposed stud. It was on this foundation that Sir Frederick built his stud. The district had been known all along for



the quality of wool grown on it and for the frame and constitution of the sheep. The introduction of all pure Peppin blood further accentuated these features.

The property is/was bounded by the Munmurra river to the east and on the west by the Talbragar river. The former river runs into the Hunter river and the latter into the Macquarie. The main dividing range of the two watersheds being on the property. In addition to this, there are four other creeks and numerous wells and springs. Dalkeith overlooks the township of Cassilis, a locality once known as 'The Private Village of Dalkeith'.

By the late 1920's, he had produced two grand champion rams at the Sydney Show. In 1927, he sold his most acclaimed ram to Boonoke for 5,000 guineas. What made this sale even more remarkable, as a condition of the sale, Dalkeith

YEAR 11 STANDARD ENGLISH

This term Year 11 have been studying Module B: Close Study of Literature. This unit has focused on Australian author Craig Silvey's acclaimed novel, Jasper Jones. Specifically, students have been studying contextual aspects of the novel's setting (a remote mining town in Western Australia) and the prevailing attitude of the town's residents (racist and narrow-minded.) The action of the novel is set in late 1965 against the backdrop of the Vietnam War.

For the past few weeks students have been engaged in reading the novel, exploring its distinctive qualities and re-visiting essay writing. Students have been developing their understanding of prose fiction and its associated features, including character, narrative voice, themes, use of imagery and symbolism, etc.

Zucchini Garlic Bites - Don't Lose This

Ingredients

- 1 cup zucchini grated and drained well
- legg
- 1/3 cup breadcrumbs
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese grated fine
- 1 clove garlic grated fine
- 2 tablespoons fresh chives chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley chopped
- 1 teaspoon fresh basil chopped
- 1 teaspoon fresh oregano chopped
- pinch of salt and pepper
- tomato sauce for dipping

Instructions

Preheat oven to 400°F. Lightly coat a baking sheet with olive oil or non-stick spray. Set aside.

Use a box grater to grate the zucchini into a clean towel. Roll up the towel and twist to wring out the moisture. Grate the garlic using the small holes on the box grater.

In a medium bowl, combine all of the ingredients and mix well.

Shape a tablespoon of the mixture into your hands, pat into small balls, and place on the baking sheet.

Bake for 15-18 minutes in the preheated oven until golden. Serve warm with marinara sauce. Recipe makes about 16 bites.

REFLECTION - PENTECOST 11 – John 6:35,41-51

The Gospel continues to build on the miracle of the bread and the presentation of Jesus as the new Moses. The Jews last week had asked for a sign and gave Jesus the text, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat'. Jesus picks up this imagery of bread from heaven to describe his own mission from God to nourish the world. The Jews in the story do not realise Jesus' true origins from God for they see only his human origins, his mother and father in Nazareth. Jesus continues to use 'bread' as a symbol for his teaching and to contrast his teaching with that of Moses.

Jewish authors had written a legend that Moses had in fact gone up to heaven and seen God and he was therefore able to return to earth with true revelation of what he had seen. The Fourth Gospel refutes this legend and teaches that no-one has gone up to heaven to see God. The only one who can truly reveal God is one who has come from God, namely Jesus.

audience The Jewish has struggled to understand Jesus so far in his 'homily', but their confusion grows even more when, at the end of this passage, the language turns to the Eucharist as Jesus speaks of eating his flesh. Up until this point 'bread' has been a metaphor for teaching. When Jesus speaks of eating his flesh, the metaphor has become the sacramental language of the Christian Eucharist. The issue now is where can Christians of all times have contact with Jesus so that they can believe and be nourished by him? (From 'Sundays Under the Southern Cross' by Mary Coloe PBVM)

A Walk Down Memory Lane WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

be permitted to mate fifty ewes with the ram next season, the monetary value of the deal was enormously increased. The remarkable feature of the sale was that it was made to Boonoke, for never before in it's fifty years existence had the stud bought an outside ram. The blood of course was the same, the Dalkeith stud having been founded and developed on Boonoke stock. Three years earlier , Dalkeith bought a 1600 guinea ram from the Falkiners. The ram exerted a most potent influence on the flock he was known as F2.

Mr Otway Falkiner of Boonoke, also bred Clydsdale and Thoroughbred horses. He won the 1932 Sydney Cup with a race horse called David. The Dalkeith ram he won the 1928 Grand Champion ram with he had named David of Dalkeith after his racehorse.

During the early 1950's, David's form was copied from photographs by Arthur Douglas Robertson and reproduced in plastic, which we have come to know as the Golden Fleece ram.

Another famous ram, which has been mistaken for David, is a ram bred by Uardry Merino stud at Hay in the Riverina owned by Charles Mills. This ram was Grand Champion at the Sydney Show in 1932 and his form was used on the one shilling coin from 1938 to 1964. The same image was again used on the 1991 fifty cent coin to mark twenty five years of decimal currency in Australia.

OUTCOMES FROM COUNCIL MEETING - JULY 26, 2021

MR358 EARTHWORKS AND PLANT HIRE

Council supports the recommendation to not call tenders for a section of preliminary earthworks on Coulson's Creek Road in accordance with Section 55–3(i) and (k) of the Local Government Act 1993. Inviting tenders would not achieve a satisfactory result due to the urgency of works being required to protect the environment and the road from further slips. Council supports the decision to enter into hourly rates contract with available plant hirers to allow these works to commence as soon as possible, and undertake immediate recovery of material before it becomes unrecoverable.

WASTE MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

Council has adopted the Waste Management Strategy 2021-31 following public exhibition. Minor amendments were made subsequent to consideration of feedback received during the public exhibition period.

MERRIWA CYCLE AND WALKWAY

Council supported the recommendation to use the Merriwa Economic Development and Tourism Committee as the primary method for obtaining community feedback and input to the final design and delivery of the Merriwa Cycle and Walkway project.

Council also endorsed the application of the 'New Kerbing, Guttering & Paving for Footpaths and Cycleways' policy with no exemptions in order to generate a portion of the funds required for Councils co-contribution for the project.

COMMUNITY DONATIONS

Council has supported the following requests for community donations:

- \$200.00 to Blandford Public School to assist in the cost of their 150 year celebrations;
- \$100.00 to Merriwa Pony Club to assist with the publication of their 75 Year Pony Club Book.
- The provision of in-kind support for the King of the Ranges event.

NSW GOVERNMENT FUTURE OF GAS STATEMENT

Upper Hunter Shire Council welcomes the NSW Government's decision outlined in the Future of Gas Statement to not renew the expired petroleum exploration licenses [PELs] within the shire and the prohibition of any future gasfield development in the Upper Hunter.

"The protection of our prime agricultural land, our diverse agricultural industries and the precious water resources they rely upon was the guiding principle behind Council's long held opposition to CSG exploration and extraction within the shire." Mayor Collison said. "I am glad NSW Government's Future of Gas Statement aligns with this vision."

CARAMILK DUMP CAKE

Dump cakes are a simply layer of all the ingredients in the pan, bake and enjoy!

8 INGREDIENTS

- 2 x 133g pkt Golden Oreo
- 395g can sweetened condensed milk
- 150g Biscoff spread
- 180g block Caramilk chocolate, chopped
- 540g pkt caramel cake mix
- 150g cold unsalted butter, thinly sliced into approx. 30 pieces
- 125ml (1/2 cup) milk
- Vanilla ice-cream, to serve

DIRECTIONS

Step 1 - Preheat oven to 200C/180C fan forced. Grease a 5cm deep 26 x 20cm rectangle cake pan. Line with baking paper, overhanging the sides.

Step 2 - Arrange biscuits in a single layer over the base of the prepared pan. Pour over condensed milk. Dollop with Biscoff spread and spread slightly to cover. Scatter with caramilk pieces. Sprinkle with the cake mix, spreading with a fork to cover. Arrange butter in rows over the top and carefully pour over the milk.

Step 3 - Bake for 35-40 minutes. Set aside in the pan to cool completely .

Step 4 - Use the baking paper to remove cake from the pan. Cut into slices and serve with ice-cream.
