A Walk Down Memory Lane WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

THE DAPHNE BOWMAN HOSPITAL, CASSILIS

In 1927, Daphne Bowman, realising the great need of the local women and children, sought help from the President of the Merriwa CWA, Mrs Violet Jennings, who suggested forming a CWA branch at Cassilis. The first meeting was held in the Cassilis Memorial Park on June 11 1927. From this meeting a CWA branch was formed at Cassilis. At the second meeting, held in July 1927, the need for a hospital was stressed and so it was decided the first branch project should be a hospital building to treat urgent cases as the nearest hospital was at Merriwa, 27 miles away. After many fundraising activities and projects, at last there was enough money to call tenders for the building. Sir Frederick McMaster donated a block of ground, and also £30 which was used to purchase the first bed and equipment (called the "Dalkeith" bed). Sir Frederick also donated an outside laundry, a hot water service and an AGA stove (the stove was sold by tender about 1955, Leo Constable bought the stove for £60 for the new dwelling on our property). Other donations came from Cassilis Repatriation Fund, CWA of NSW donated £300 in 1928 and many other donations from every family in the district. In May 1930, £500 was placed in a hospital account, the first part of the cottage hospital was built and opened on September 24 1934.

The success was a major effort as one remembers that these were the depression years. Five beds were in use most of the time and in 1937, electricity was installed and in 1938, a new wing was added. By 1939, the hospital was becoming a heavy burden for the upkeep had dramatically increased. Fund raising became very important and allowed the CWA to function freely.

In May 1958, a disaster to the community, the branch and the hospital with the sudden death of Dr Irene Bray, their greatest benefactor. Dr Bray was born in 1892 in Cootamundra NSW.

On Saturday July 5 1924, Cassilis at last had a resident medical officer, when Dr Bray and her mother were welcomed to the town. A house belonging to the Braggett family was leased for Dr Bray to reside in and conduct her practice.





Writing, writing, writing and more writing has been a huge focus in the Stage 3 classroom this term. The results have been outstanding and students have been taking on lots of feedback and ensuring their writing continues to improve. One of our focus for improvement is to work on imagery in our writing. Instead of telling the audience what is happening show the audience using senses to create atmosphere and build the setting, characters, and storyline. The students have also been experimenting with metaphors and similes. Students' work is being displayed in the classroom and a selection in the front office.

Here are some snippets from the writing

'At that abrupt moment Georgina heard a meteoric gun shoot. Then she heard a scream which sounded like her mother's scream. But in that snap of a moment she heard an intense voice shouting at a little girl. Then she heard a wailing of a baby.'

"Is that you mum", "Yes", with tears in her eyes like the water in the ocean. I hugged her. We were both crying we needed to go and then I felt like I was home.

'The river flows so soft that it is calming. I can feel the ewwy gooey mud between my toes. Some of it has stuck and is forming some sort of mud shoe, so when I have to walk through a harsh bed of pebbles it doesn't hurt as much.'

'As Mary was climbing the gate, it was creaking it was like the entrance to a haunted mansion. As she was at the top of the gate, she referred it to as starting a whole new life. Mary finally reached the other side of the gate wearing a half-ripped gown and slippers.'

Through English we have been establishing links to our History topic about creating the country of Australia. We have had a particular focus on texts to do with the Stolen Generation.

Last week the students were asked to work in pairs to re-enact and interview a significant member of Australia during the time of Federation. The students researched and produced a wonderful interview. The students particularly enjoyed dressing up and performing for their classmates. It was a great learning experience and brought history to life. Some of the people interviewed were- Louisa and Henry Lawson, Edmund Barton, Queen Victoria and Vida Goldstein. We look forward to learning more about how our government is set up and gaining extra knowledge for when we visit Parliament House in Canberra latter in the year.

After researching jingles and what makes up a jingle, we have turned to technology and have created our own. First using a program called Chrome Music Lab then importing the jingles into a program called Audacity so the students could add a voice before creating a PowerPoint presentation to promote the product. It has been amazing how technology can play such an important role in music production. The students are looking forward to sharing with their classmates.

We continue to see wonderful progress in our learning groups with Stage 2. Students are placed into ability groups to address their specific needs. The results are wonderful, and the students continue to develop independent skills being more in control of their own learning and expectations.

We have been very fortunate over the last 5 weeks to have Kristy with us to refine our cricket skills. We enjoyed our sessions with Kristy and look forward to picking up the skills of the Australian cricketers when we next watch it on the TV.

This week we will be participating in our Cross-Country carnival- we wish all the students the best of luck and look forward to sharing the results with you.





MERRIWA-CASSILIS ALLIANCE

Safeguarding Our Strategic Agricultural Land

Background: TransGrid are planning to build two high voltage 500KV power lines, an electricity superhighway 180km long, through productive farming land which runs from Merriwa North West towards Cassilis and then south of Dunedoo. Environmental Impact Statements are planned to start mid this year and construction early 2023.

TRANSGRID MEET WITH LANDHOLDERS

70 landholders from Merriwa-Cassilis districts filled the RSL Club auditorium to Covid capacity on Friday 12 March 2021 for a meeting with Transgrid and NSW Department of Planning; representing some 28% of the 250 landholder's who will be affected by the proposal.

Transgrid's Executive Manager, Major Projects, Sean McGoldrick opened the meeting with an introduction on the project. Transgrid revealed that it isn't ONE high voltage power line but actually TWO; with the 'option' of these two 80m easements to run parallel to each other or separately.

Both the President, Peter Campbell, and the Vice President, Tony Inder, of the Merriwa-Cassilis Alliance thanked all attendees and spoke decisively on the objectives, concerns and recommendations of the newly formed landholders group.

There were also many questions from the floor from concerned landholders. Farmers discussed the impact Transgrid's restrictions on routine farming operations around the power lines will have on their production capacity; making many businesses unviable. Height restrictions on farming machinery, interference on guidance technology and the no go area for aerial management means crops would not be managed in a timely and cost effective manner. Some properties would potentially be cut in half by the power line. Many family homes were in the proposed corridor raising health concerns. The significant negative impact on land values was also discussed.

The meeting was chaired by Brian Elton of Elton Consulting. A summary of MCA's key points;

Please be very clear that the Merriwa-Cassilis Alliance (MCA) does NOT oppose the goal of delivering renewable energy. MCA specifically oppose the location of the proposed study corridor for the following reasons;

1. The Merriwa Cassilis plateau is a highly productive parcel of land in the Upper Hunter, NSW, that is classified as Strategic Agricultural Land by NSW State Government. This area plays a critical role in food and fibre production for Australian consumers.

Agriculture in the Merriwa-Cassilis sub-region produces an estimated \$103.635 million in gross revenue (23% of all agricultural revenue for the Upper Hunter Shire total) and supports 334 jobs. One in four agricultural jobs in the Upper Hunter Shire (or 26%) is based in the Merriwa-Cassilis region.

*REMPLAN modelling for the Upper Hunter Shire is based on ABS 2016 Census Place of Work Employment (Scaled), ABS 2017 / 2018 National Input Output Tables, and ABS June 2019 Gross State Product.

- 2. The Feasibility Study to determine the location of the proposed corridor is incomplete. Transgrid admitted there was no agricultural expertise within the project's technical working group who carried out the desk-top feasibility study
- 3. The affected landholders, were not consulted earlier in the process, or given access to any information regarding alternative proposals considered. MCA have requested a full copy of the feasibility study from Transgrid which they have stated will be available at the end of March 2021.

For this process by Transgrid to be comprehensive and transparent MCA has a number of recommendations.

1. Form a reference working group representing private landholders from the Merriwa Plateau, agriculture, Transgrid, and Department of

Planning Industry and Environment.

Our objective is to ensure the final feasibility study determining the location of the corridor and ultimately the power line route is comprehensive and transparent.

This working group would extensively review every alternate route for these power lines; evaluate previously considered options as well as our own options.

The landscape and terrain is intrinsically known to the landowners on the Merriwa plateau. Our knowledge and understanding of the constraints and opportunities on alternative routes will be invaluable.

2. Extend by 12 months the 'study corridor refined' and consultation period til mid-late 2022

An extension of time is required;

To complete a comprehensive and thorough feasibility study on the location options for the proposed corridor.

To ensure not only the impacted landholders are aware of Transgrid's project but also neighbours, businesses and the local community of Merriwa and Cassilis, and that they have the opportunity to all be consulted.

Transgrid's proposal and the way it has been delivered to date is causing undue stress and anxiety on all our members. MCA stands united in our objective.

To gain any level of trust in the consultation process MCA president says "We haven't had the opportunity for a two way conversation up until now so we hope going forward this will happen. We want to work with Transgrid and Government. MCA await their response. "

Transgrid's Executive Manager, Sean McGoldrick, stated at the end of the meeting Transgrid would respond to MCA's recommendations from the meeting within two weeks through their Community Engagement Manager, Michael Lloyd.

A Walk Down Memory Lane

Dr Bray immediately won her way into the hearts of the town. As a physician, she was very skilled , she had a brilliant career first of all becoming a graduate of the Sydney University and then took up medicine and did a further five years study and passed with such brilliant examination results that the medical school tried to get her to take up medical research work. She graduated from Sydney University in 1922. She delivered over 400 babies in her time at Cassilis. Attempts were made to attract another medical officer after her death but proved unsuccessful and the hospital eventually had to close.






