A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

ST HELIERS

St Heliers was first taken up by Lieutenant Colonel Henry Dumaresq. The homestead was built using convict labour. After the death of Henry Dumaresa on the 5th March 1838, St Heliers was managed by Mr John Hudson Keys for a long period after which Mr Ebenezer Hall became the proprietor. In the course of time, the younger members of the Hall family inherited the place and it was eventually bought from them by the late Malcolm Campbell (founder of Campbells Stores in the Upper Hunter) and for years managed by the late Mr John Crockett, a member of his wife Isabella's family. After the death of Malcolm Campbell in 1905, Isabella and her son, Mr J M Campbell controlled the property thereafter.

My grandfather, James Timothy O'Keefe moved to the Hunter Valley in 1922 to manage St Heliers for J M Campbell. He brought with him, his two eldest sons, Tom and George to work on the property with him. The following year, he travelled to Tumut to move the rest of his family to live in the homestead at St Heliers. In 1929, St Heliers was split up and sold off. The homestead block was purchased by Harold Watts and in 1932, he married Mollie, the eldest daughter of my grandparents, James and Clara O'Keefe. The McCully's Gap community farewelled the family and presented them with an attractive silver tea service. It seems that the family may have lived on at St Heliers for some time before moving to Cassilis in 1936 to manage the sheep property 'Wynola' owned by Les Weidman of Muswellbrook.

I grew up in the 50's and early 60's visiting the property and learnt about the dead tree just inside the front gateway where the road turned off the McCully's Gap road. The tree, it seemed was used to tie the convict labourers to, for punishment. We always knew of it as the

whipping tree. An article in an old newspaper mentions this and a bell which was rung to rouse the convicts to start work and to cease work at the end of the day. The bell is said to have been taken to Muswellbrook where it was used to summon help when fire broke out.

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is conducted each year for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in all government and non-government schools. This program, which has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers, assesses the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools.

The results of the tests provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and are used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's achievement will be reported against the national reporting bands, national averages and national minimum standard.

Background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) is collected as part of this program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The tests are conducted across Australia on the same days for all students.

In the Numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. In Years 7 and 9 there will be two Numeracy tests: one where a calculator is allowed and one where calculators are not used. For the calculator test the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.





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Secondarywww living history

On Tuesday March 24, Merriwa Central School was visited by Shane Blackman, owner and operator of WWI Living History - a business dedicated to travelling around New South Wales and teaching students in an interactive manner about World War I using real artefacts and accurate replicas. While presenting to the school, Shane used a combination of genuine sincerity for storytelling, real world advice for students and comedy to keep the students entertained and engaged.

The premise for the double period session was simple: a student would come up to the display held in the hall and pick an item. Any item they wished. Shane would tell the school about the item what the item was made of and carefully demonstrate how the item would be used. But more importantly, he would recall stories of the very real experiences of men that fought in the war taken from various sources to paint a graphic and realistic picture of the horrors endured. The items were then passed around the hall and students were encouraged by Shane to hold, feel, smell and even taste (if they REALLY wanted to) the items.

Isaac Constable of Year 8 was the first volunteer allowed to choose an item. Now I thought that the first item chosen would be something along the lines of a grenade, rifle ammunition or the massive artillery shell that sat perched atop the display stand that I myself secretly wanted to be chosen. But Isaac instead turned around from the display holding a field-made club, or "whacker thing" as one student affectionately called it. Made from a shovel handle and a cog from farm machinery, Shane's description of it and its usage set the tone for the session - terribly interesting and terribly morbid simultaneously.

Alyssa Carrall of Year 9 did not hesitate at choosing the bayonet, but was not expecting that to go alongside this, she would also be handling the wooden replica training rifle that the bayonet would be affixed to. This training rifle is designed to not be able to fire at all - it has a wooden sealed barrel, no firing mechanism and rounds cannot be loaded into it. To demonstrate this, Shane had Dakota Turner of Year 10 pull the trigger while pointing the rifle upwards to show that it could not do anything. Dakota pulled on the trigger and Shane yelled out "BANG!" startling her, Miss Golden and a number of others nearby who were not expecting this. Training ammunition which cannot fire as well as a clip

and magazine were also shown to students.

Raine Gee of Year 7 went straight for the artillery shell, much to my delight while Jeremy Clarke of Year 9 plucked the large toy rat and began cuddling it. With the current situation around town regarding rodents, there were several displeased and even disgusted individuals from the prop and the stories of rats in the trenches, although Jeremy had no problems with holding it to his face and scratching its chin.

Annabelle Orton of Year 8 had the unfortunate experience of becoming a prisoner of war as she selected the steel handcuffs. Before these were properly passed around, Shane decided to lock them as Mervyn Turner of Year 8 had managed to lock one of them to his wrist and could not get it off. Consequently, Brooke McLennan of Year 10, who chose the pistol and harness containing a variety of gear such as a dagger, played the role of a stealthy capturer of prisoners as well as an enemy sentry to be taken out quickly and quietly. It was during this demonstration that Miss Waters is quoted as saying "Oh my God, no!" to one particularly gruesome description of how a dagger was used during times of war.

The grand finale was a full dress-up in a uniform including a tunic, scarf, harness, helmet, coat and the training rifle from earlier to be donned by a student. Roy Lawler of Year 9 was the lucky student who got to demonstrate the uniform. It shocked some students to know that teenagers not too much older than Roy looked very similar to him over 100 years ago.

Shane continually demonstrated a deep understanding of World War I and World War II throughout the two periods. Even our resident war history enthusiast and difficult question asker Jack Sumpter-Cornish of Year 10 was impressed by Shane's knowledge as Shane answered every question Jack could think of. To have such knowledge of the Great War, especially in a time where there are no living survivors of

the war, is crucial for our students to understand help a period of time set and a of circumstances that we never want to see repeated. For this, I would like to thank Shane Blackman on behalf of Merriwa Central School

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REFLECTION - EASTER 4 - John 10:11-18

The image of the Good Shephard express Jesus' utterly free gift of himself for us. Later in Gethsemane there will be armed soldiers and he will be arrested, and from then on it could appear that Jesus is a victim of Jewish and Roman law. Today's Gospel makes it clear that Jesus' death is an act of loving self-surrender. He is the shepherd who places his own life at risk to defend his flock. He is the shepherd who will even die if that will enable his flock to live. This is a difficult image to transpose to our Australian culture. Perhaps we need to look at life-savers or firemen/women who go into danger for others. Jesus is a volunteer.

This then raises two questions: 'What does Jesus save us from?'' and 'What does Jesus save us for?'

In this brief space I can only say that Jesus saves us from the evil of ignorance of God as Jesus knows God. The God Jesus reveals is one who loves this world and calls us to be beloved sons and daughters. In making this God known Jesus drew down the wrath of those whose god was too small and restrictive. Faced with their opposition, Jesus could have withdrawn and saved his life, but instead he chose to continue teaching and revealing his God, knowing that his choice would lead to death. So that we would know the depths of God's love, Jesus lays down his life. He is the shepherd who dies that we may be truly alive. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)




