### A Walk Down Memory Lane

### WITH JAMES CONSTABLE JOHN WATT HUMPHRIES



Mr John Humphries joined the staff of M Campbell in 1864, then a lad of 17, when the store was in Sydney street Muswellbrook, on the site where the BP Subway Service station now stands. He worked his way into positions of trust and responsibility. It was identified early that the site was flood prone and a site was purchased in 1869, a building erected and the business opened there in 1871. Mr Humphries was put in charge of the grocery section and in 1877, when Mr Campbell went to England, Humphries was put in charge of affairs as manager.

It was around this time that Mr Malcolm Campbell is thought to have taken a lesser interest in the active management of the business. John Watt Humphries married Jessica Crockett, younger sister of Malcolm Campbell's wife Isabella in May 1879.

In 1888, a new home "Atherstone" was built high on the hill in Sowerby street (The property was auctioned in 1975 'to wind up a family estate').

In 1903, the business was incorporated and Mr J W Humphries was appointed managing director and Mr Malcolm Campbell was chairman of directors. Since 1903, the business continued to



expand and during Mr J W Humphries regime, stores were acquired at Merriwa (in 1903, M Campbell & Co purchased the store from George Pearson formerly known as the Beehive store.) Aberdeen, Denman and Rouchel. (later also a store at Moonan Flat). A garage was acquired at Murrurundi. Mr Humphries died at his home 'Atherstone' in November 1929, at the age of 81 years. His illness was of a short duration, commencing from about a fortnight prior to his death when he took a serious turn while engaged at the office.

### **BEST START YEAR 7 ASSESSMENT**

Dear parents and carers,

Year 7 students will participate in the Best Start Year 7 Assessment in Term 1, 2021.

Best Start Year 7 is an online literacy and numeracy assessment available to secondary schools that assesses key literacy and numeracy skills of Year 7 students. It is designed to assist teachers to identify students who may require additional support in developing their literacy and numeracy skills. The assessment is undertaken between 1 February to 5 March.

The purpose of the Best Start Year 7 assessment is to provide feedback to teachers to help identify student needs. Feedback will be provided to teachers who may choose to share this with students, parents and carers during teacher interview processes.

Best Start Year 7 is just one of a range of assessments the school uses to assess students.

Please inform the school if your child has special needs requiring support to complete an online assessment.

#### **Optional advice:**

Students will be asked to bring headphones or earbuds that plug into a computer to enable them to hear audio during the assessment. Earbuds used for mobile phones or other portable devices may be suitable for use during the assessment. The type of computer connection needed is a jack or USB.

HOMEWORK AT CASSILIS PUBLIC SCHOOL

Commonly known as the 'queen of common sense', Maggie Dent has become one of Australia's favourite parenting authors and educators.

Maggie discuses homework in one of her blogs.

'I am the anti-homework queen. Even as a highschool teacher I never gave homework other than reading texts. Children's brains are tired after school and the last thing they need to be doing is mindless sheets of boring homework. Unless it is relevant, interesting and massively engaging it is largely a waste of time. There is no research to show that homework in primary school improves school performance. Children especially need to be playing with other children or their parents and relaxing getting ready for the next day's schooling!'

At Cassilis, the homework is reading. The benefits of doing this each night are HUGE as confidence and ability increases, kids will enjoy reading more.

Please support your child in their reading each night. Sometimes this means straight afterschool, sometimes it is just before sleep as part of their bedtime routine or sometimes reading happens in the morning before school. Whatever the time, reading to and listening to your children read is a wonderful way to help their learning and a beautiful way to spend quality time together. All students, Kinder-Year 6, will benefit from reading and being read stories.

The staff love to hear about the students resting, creating, exploring, playing, swimming, drawing or helping around the house after school.

### JOLLY PHONICS

Students in Kindergarten follow the Jolly Phonics sequence of introducing letters and sounds. A booklet will go home so you know the action to match each sound. These really help your child to memorise them so feel free to practice them at home.

Last week students learnt the 's' sound with 'a' and 't' being taught this week.

Students practice making, hearing, writing these sounds and love making artwork to match. Along with the sounds, students will be learning to sight words featured on the Butterfly Chart. This chart will also be sent home for your information. These common words are used a lot in our early readers and in sentence writing.

### REFLECTION - EPIPHANY 6 - Mark 1:40-45

This is one of my favourite Gospel passages. So often I come to prayer feeling like this leper in need of Jesus' healing touch. I hear the desperation in his voice as he pleads, 'If you want to you can cure me'. But deep down he sonders who would want to have anything to do with a leper. Lepers are outcasts, the disfigured cast-offs of a society that only wants perfection. What's more in those times lepers were obviously sinners and this was God's punishment. They deserved it. Who would want to respond to a leper? Note that any disfiguring skin disease was called leprosy.

Jesus does respond in a way far beyond the man's hopes. He touches him. He does not step back and cure from a distance with words, but actually reaches out and places his hand on the wretch's human body. In this touch more than physical healing is accomplished. He is no longer alienated but has been joined by another.

This encounter impacts also on Jesus. He now becomes the outcast as he is forced to stay outside the towns in places where no-one lives. The text doesn't tell us why this is and sometimes it is interpreted as if Jesus is so popular that he is besieged and so stays away from the villages. But it is also possible that people are afraid of Jesus since he has had physical contact with a leper and so he is not considered diseased and forced to live where lepers live.

Jesus takes to himself my 'leprosy' allowing me to go free. (From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)

### Upper Hunter Shire Council RECENT UPGRADES FOR MERRIWA

Two great recreation facility upgrades in Merriwa are complete:

- Merriwa Showground has a new toilet block, 100,000 litre water tank and arena irrigation (\$185,000)
- Merriwa Oval has an upgraded canteen, change rooms, toilets and lighting as well as work on the playing surface with top dress, level and seeding (\$261,00)

The projects were undertaken by Upper Hunter Shire Council and funded by the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund (SCCF) – round 2, that involved 12 projects across the Shire.

Mayor Maurice Collison said it was a great result through local clubs, Council and the NSW Government working together.

President of the Showground User Committee, Robert Tindall said,

"The Merriwa Showground User Committee would like to thank the funding committee for their contribution to the upgrading of facilities at the Merriwa Showground.

The addition of two new abolition blocks, arena irrigation system, huge storage tank and the planting of new trees has added a lot to the showground. The showground is the focal point of so many of Merriwa's major events throughout the year.

Our grounds are now more user friendly with wheel chair access toilets, safer with improved hygiene, Covid-19 safer plus the community appreciates our ability to control dust levels in dryer times.
