A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE

FATHER O'REILLY



William Edmund O'Reilly was born in Trim, County Meath, Ireland on September 28 1858. Father O'Reilly's first appointment in Australia was to the Cathedral Parish in West Maitland. Three years later he was appointed to the Merriwa Mission in March 1886.

The house which became the Presbytery is believed to have been part of the United States exhibit at Sydney's Great International Exhibition in 1879. The house was purchased and transported to Merriwa but not much else is known about the house. When renovations were carried out by one of the doctor's who later owned the house, a board was found with the legend "Appeco Bleakley Sydney, American Pitch Pine Export Co. New Orleans, LA. for export Sydney.


The house was the Catholic Presbytery from about 1886, until 1913. By mutual agreement, Father O'Reilly exchanged houses with the local medical officer, Dr R.W.L. Schuette. Details of the exchange arent known, but what may have prompted the move, was Witney's creek, also known as Doctor's creek, was prone to flooding and the priest couldn't get to the church and

the doctor was isolated (up beside the church in what is now known as the Catholic Presbytery) from the town. Doctors Armstrong, O'Flannagan and Turkington had lived in the house before Dr Schuette.

Father O'Reilly was parish priest of Merriwa for 36 years and became one of it's leaders in many activities in the life of the church and the town. Father O'Reilly was a great promoter of the saints of Ireland and a public holiday was declared for the area with the whole district getting into the festivities. The Merriwa and Cassilis Standard reported the celebrations on March 21, 1896. The NSW Government refused to grant a public holiday in NSW and so Father O'Reilly canvassed all the various shopkeepers, not just the Catholics and the town had it's public holiday, with the Merriwa and Cassilis March 17, St Patrick's Standard announcing





Secondary ENGLISH REPORT

Year 8 English have been engaged in the work unit Aliens and Other Worlds. They have been exploring characters as diverse as aliens, vampires, witches, robots and so on. We are currently at the early stages of revising narrative writing which will help students in preparation for their writing folio assessment. Also, student workbooks have been collected and written feedback has been provided.

Year 10 English are studying a work unit focussed on the concept of Power. They have been examining the nature of power, how it is represented through texts and how it applies to our own lives. Students have been engaged in composing a variety of personal responses which will assist them in their writing folio assessment. Workbooks will be collected this week.

Year 11 English Studies are currently studying the unit Achieving Through English – English in Education, Work and Community. The students' focus is presently on finding their place in the workforce and determining the skills they will require to undertake particular jobs. They have been accessing the Job Outlook website to this end.

Year 11 Standard English are engaged in the unit Reading to Write – Transition to Senior English. They have been examining the reciprocal nature of the relationship between reading and writing. Students have also been a variety of texts in order to respond to what a text is about and how the composer represents meaning through a variety of language features.







START OF SCHOOL


Playground play starts at 8.45am.



REFLECTION - LENT 1 - Mark 1:9-15

Wilderness times are moments of crisis - moments when choice and change are forced upon us. It is rare that we walk willingly into a wilderness, usually it is the result of losing our way or an accident. The Gospel tells us that Jesus was 'driven by the Spirit' into the wilderness. For all its starkness and inhospitableness a wilderness can also be an invitation to discover depths in ordinary living can leave untapped, for a wilderness demands more resourcefulness than the everyday norm. This is why the wilderness is often used as a place for initiation in ancient relegators, for here a person can meet the Divine reality with greater immediacy.

Jesus experienced such a time of wilderness immediately after his experience of John's baptism, which was obviously a deep religious awakening event. Do not let his divinity shroud the truth of his full humanity and therefore his need to search and question as we do. We are not told by Mark what he experiences in the wilderness, but no doubt it was a time of reflection on this event, and wondering about his response. He emerges from the wilderness time to begin his public proclamation of God's reign.

Lent invites us to share Jesus' experience of a wilderness time, to allow God's Spirit to drive us very the next forty days so that we, like Jesus, can meet with God and God's desire for us. May this be a rich and blessed time of encounter with God. From "Sundays Under the Southern Cross" by Mary Coloe PBVM)

WHAT IS HAPPENING WITH YOUR WASTE?

That's the question the Council is exploring to inform the development of the UHSC 10-year Waste Strategy. Council is currently undertaking a three phase process to better understand how the Shire uses and manages their waste to inform and enhance the delivery of services and the allocation of resources for the next 10 years.

The phases are:

- 1. An EPA funded Waste and Recycling Survey completed last week. Through this survey we were wanting to understand community habits with waste. Bin contents from randomly selected households are being collected and analyzed, with a report to be provided to Council.
- 2. Telephone Survey of residents in the Shire. These calls started on Monday 8 February and will be made for two weeks. It will only take about 10mins to share your thoughts so if you get a call from IRIS Research please don't hang up (they're not trying to sell you anything), we just want to know what you think
- 3. Broader community consultation on the 10 year Waste Strategy.

INCREDIBLE RESPONSE TO OUR RECENT HOUSEHOLD CHEMICAL CLEANOUT!

Nearly, 8 tonnes of problem household waste has been recovered from sheds, garages and homes in the Upper Hunter. Over 2142kg of paint, over 1052kg of pesticides and so many other strange, out-of-date and toxic substances, including a turtle soup can! There was a huge increase in the number of residents taking the opportunity to get rid of potentially hazardous material from their homes and disposed of safely. Thanks to everyone who took part.




