A Walk Down Memory Lane

WITH JAMES CONSTABLE MERRIWA HOSPITAL



The first public hospital in Merriwa was occupied in 1884 and two years later on March 1886, an area of eight acres was formally dedicated as a site for a public hospital. In 1892, a new hospital comprising two wards, an operating room, kitchen and laundry was built on the present hospital site. The architect was John W Pender of Maitland and the builder, John Leard of Merriwa.

The new hospital was opened on March 7, 1892 and at the opening, it was reported at the time that "many hardships were experienced in obtaining proper medical attention and nursing patients, with hospitals no nearer than Muswellbrook, Scone or Mudgee, any of which places could not be reached under a journey of 45 miles and therefore the hospital must be regarded as a boon in our midst.

Towards the turn of the century, the public spirit appears to have waned and this prompted the following article to be published in the 'Merriwa and Cassilis Standard' of June 1896 "a beautiful illustration of the profound apathy into which a small town can sink is to be found in Merriwa just now. First the School of Arts meeting, next the








Common annual meeting, then the Hospital Ball and afterwards the hospital meeting all fell through for want of attendance. At none of these meetings could a quorum be gathered. A severe drain was placed on the hospital's accommodation and resources during 1902 when there was an outbreak of typhoid fever. Ten cases were recorded and resulted in the death of one child.

The landed gentry gave their leadership and support and a race meeting was conducted on 6 June 1904 in aid of the hospital at the Brindley Park race course. The hospital continued to improve the facilities available for the treatment

NEW SECONDARY JERSEY

Secondary students have been keen to update our existing 7-12 winter uniform with a Canterbury jersey. Students have voted on several options and this is the winning design. The estimated cost of the new jerseys will be around \$60-70. It is anticipated that the jersey will be ordered through the school.

Like any change to school uniform it will be introduced over a period of time, with 2021 and 2022 the transition years to phase in the new jerseys. Parents are not expected to suddenly purchase new jerseys for all secondary students in one go. Let us know what you think of the new design.

E-CIGARETTES

Recently we have seen an increase in reports that students may be using e-cigarettes (otherwise known as 'vaping') across local schools and in the community. We take this issue seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on young people, who are often unaware of the risks associated with the practice.

Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapour produced by an e-cigarette or electronic vaporizer. The vapour can contain nicotine and other substances and may expose users to chemicals and toxins which are harmful to health. The devices are small and can be easily hidden in a pocket or bag. The most popular disposable vapes resemble large USB sticks or highlighter pens.

The Public Health (Tobacco) Act 2008 was amended in 2015 to define e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories to be separate from tobacco products. The Act makes many of the provisions that apply to tobacco products also apply to e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories. The Act makes it an offence:

- to sell e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories to persons aged under 18
- for adults to buy e-cigarettes and e-cigarette accessories on behalf of persons aged under 18

The NSW Department of Education has advised schools that students should not bring e-cigarettes or e-cigarette accessories onto school premises or use them during school-based activities. Consistent with Department of Education and school policy - vaping, selling or being in the possession of e-cigarettes will result in disciplinary action that may lead to a student being suspended from school.



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



The new school fence has been completed, apart from the main entry gate which needs some further work to make it more user friendly. It is wonderful to separate the car park from our main school.




THERE'S SO MUCH TO ADORE IN 3/4


Stage 2 has had a fantastic start to the new school year. The first 4 weeks have flown by with students eagerly engaged in their learning and gaining new knowledge and skills from exciting learning opportunities.

In Mathematics we have learnt about whole number, addition and subtraction. Students have learnt a variety of strategies to help them solve addition and subtraction questions and word problems. A couple of weeks ago, students had the fantastic opportunity to participate in a variety of hands-on problem-solving maths activities, when we had World of Maths visit us. Stage 2 were very excited to work in groups with Stage 3 to use their skills of teamwork, problem solving and perseverance to achieve the possible outcomes and answers of the 17 activities. Needless to say, these activities taught them several Math concepts whilst encouraging important 21st Century skills of creativity, collaboration and critical thinking.

The focus for English this term is narrative. We have looked at and analysed the sequence of different narrative stories. Stage 2 have been developing a deeper understanding of the structure consisting of an orientation, complication and resolution and the language features to create an engaging and interesting story. Throughout the term students will enjoy time to write and share their own narratives to the rest of the class. Students also complete activities to develop comprehension, spelling, grammar, handwriting and computing skills.

In Religion we have been learning about Jesus' ministry. Throughout the unit students will gain knowledge and understanding of Jesus' ministry and how his words and actions showed love and compassion for people. The class have enjoyed reading and watching some of Jesus' healing stories such as: The Blind Man, The Paralysed Man and the 10 Lepers.





Heat, light, electrical energy, the behaviour of light as well as the effects of heat energy (melting and expanding) are the focus of our Science lessons this term. Students have been enjoyed looking at the concepts of reflection and shadows through experimenting with mirrors, torches, and everyday objects. Students will make predictions, plan, conduct, assess, retest, and draw conclusions on how energy can be generated sustainably.

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The first 2 terms this year we will be studying History and our topic is First Contacts. The topic provides opportunities for students to build inquiry skills to assist in explaining how people, events and the past have shaped, and continue to shape, our world. We have started learning and investigating the actions, lifestyles and choices of our indigenous people and explorers of the past. Students have been thoroughly engaged in our reading of the true story 'Nanberry' by Jackie French. This novel gives a deeper insight into the experiences of both Europeans and Aboriginal people after the first fleet as it explores Nanberry, a young Aboriginal boy who is adopted by Surgeon White in 1789 as the new colony in Sydney Cove is established. Nanberry is clever and uses his unique gifts as an interpreter to bridge the two worlds he lives in.

In Creative Arts, students will be taught Music and Visual Arts this term. In Music, students will learn and play the recorder demonstrating basic knowledge of musical concepts. The focus of the recorder will be rhythm and pitch. In Visual Arts, students will familiarise themselves with the element of design in order to create works involving patterns, contrast and balance. Students will create artworks that represent a variety of subject matter and make choices about the forms and techniques used.

Last week we celebrated wellbeing week with a multitude of activities. The beginning of the week saw students having a game of Bingo, dancing on the green, decorating some delicious treats and to finish off the week students had a shared lunch and games with their teachers. The students thoroughly enjoyed all activities and can't wait until next term's wellbeing week.

REFLECTION - LENT 2 - Mark 9:2-20

Last Sunday's Gospel described Jesus' entry into the wilderness and I suggested that this is a time of encountering God. In today's Gospel, while the setting is different, we glimpse such a moment of encounter.

It is described as a moment of transformation, or transifuration. An encounter with God changes us. In the Gospel this is depicted as the outer change in Jesus' appearance, but for most of us, the experience of God brings about an inner change, a change of heart.

Jesus knows himself in this moment to be God's beloved one. When I have heard people speak of their moments of experiencing God, they too speak of knowing themselves as God's beloved. Sometimes things get in the way of our knowing this about ourselves. Some have grown up with harsh images of God, some may look on life events and see themselves as unlovable but the Gospel insists another truth. 'God so loved the world he gave his only son'. God so loves me he gives his son! Wow! Can I believe this? Dare I believe God loves me?

In Hebrew the word for 'wilderness' is mid-bar, and the term for 'word' is d-bar. Wilderness and word are related which is why so many prophets spent time in the wilderness to seek God's word. Listen to the words of today's Gospel again. 'This is my beloved'. Take these words into your heart this week as you continue this invitation into a wilderness time.

ROTARY LONG TERM STUDENT EXCHANGE

This is a program with which our club has been greatly involved over the last 50 years.

We have hosted students from many places, as part of the year-long exchange scheme.

We have had students from Brazil, Argentina, Mexico, the USA, Canada, Denmark, Estonia, Germany and Poland, to name some of the countries, as well, we have sent local students overseas, to many diverse locations. Visiting students live with host families, usually for periods of three months. Often, our incoming students arrive with some English skills. By the time they depart, they speak very good English...with the appropriate Australian accents and all the idioms.



In Australia, students should be in Year 10 or 11 in the year that they make the application and they must return to finish their secondary education in Australia. Our experience is that this is a program which runs very well

Selection of outgoing students usually begins in April each year. The certainty of the date of resumption of the program, post Covid, has yet to be determined.

of patients, but apart from a mortuary, erected in 1903, it was not until 1922

that any further addition was made to the buildings. In that year, an Isolation block of four wards was erected. It served for some years as an isolation unit and was later converted to an obstetric block. This unit continued in use as a maternity unit until 1979.




From the beginning, finance was always a major source of concern to the committee and many much needed items of equipment could not be procured due to lack of funds. In 1930 a Public Hospitals Bill was introduced and passed by parliament. The following year, 1931, a public meeting was convened by the Merriwa Shire Council to give consideration to closing the hospital due to lack of funds. The meeting defeated a motion that the hospital should be closed.



hospital it's improved financial position in the following year and in 1933, the Government accepted increased responsibility for building and maintenance funding. During the five next years, major improvements were carried out including the building of two private wards. new operating

theatre, X-Ray room and Matron's and staff quarters. An X-Ray plant was installed and the hospital connected to a septic disposal system. A tennis court was also built during the period. However the maintenance funding of the hospital was a constant source of concern to the board, culminating in a decision by the directors to resign on October 30, 1944. Following a visit to the hospital on May 25, 1945, by the superintendent of the Hospitals Commission, Mr Otten, the board agreed to withdraw their resignations on the condition of increased financial support by the Commission.



A substantial bequest from the estate of Thomas Hogan, a district pastoralist in 1941. The hospital continues to benefit from the income from the trust (as of 1984). The hospital was fortunate to be allocated a date in 1957 by the Northern Traveller's Cot Fund to hold a Carnival in Merriwa which helped raise funds for the construction of new children's wards which were built in the following year.







Under Section 52 of the Electricity Supply Act 1995, the network operator (Ausgrid) may interrupt the supply of the electricity to a customer at such reasonable times as Ausgrid determines.
