The shortage of permanent and casual teachers is an ongoing challenge for our school, and many others across the State. At the moment we have several Head Teacher positions, and classroom teacher positions we are attempting to fill.

In this regard it is with much sadness that I announce Mrs Sevil Assistant Principal Curriculum and Instruction will be leaving us at the end of term to take up a position at Scone Public School. Mrs Sevil has been a valued member of our school for the past six years and an outstanding school leader. She takes up the position at Scone to be closer to her young family and we wish her all the very best.

Secondary News

Uniform

The weather is cooling down, so it's time to drag out the winter uniform. Parents are reminded that students are expected to be in full school uniform each day and secondary students need to have a note to explain why they may be out of uniform. Tell them from Me

Our school is taking part in the Tell Them From Me student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the Tell Them From Me survey to help them improve. As well as schools getting student feedback, the Department

of Education, through the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE), has access to data from across NSW and is running a research project to look at state-wide patterns of student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. The research is looking at how these things impact on student outcomes, including academic performance. Individual students will not be identified in any CESE publications, and all information will be handled in accordance with the relevant privacy legislation. Students' personal information will not be disclosed by the department to any other person or body other than as required by law.

This research will help schools in New South Wales to better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes.

Aggie Antics

A busy term 1 with a number of new arrivals. This term students have raised day old chickens, pullets to point of lay and the Merino Wether Challenge has commenced. Agriculture students have raised Broilers (meat chickens) weighing daily and monitoring growth rates reporting on the effect of protein in feed. Junior students have also been weighing and monitoring the growth and development of layer chickens which should commence laying eggs in the near future.

School Wether Challenge

The NSW School Merino Wether Challenge is underway and Merriwa Central School received their 6 wethers at the start of March. There are over 60 schools completing the program in 2022. Students will gain hands-on experience in the sheep and wool industry. The Dubbo National Ram Sale Committee have again purchased the wethers, and each school takes delivery of 6 merino lambs with the objective of managing them as a commercial operation to grow them into a high value 12 month old sale lamb. This long running program provides skills and knowledge in animal husbandry and the profitability of the

larger sheep and wool industry. At the end of the six months in August 2022 students will present the wethers for judging in Dubbo at the annual Rabobank National Merino Show and Sale.

Wethers sourced from one nucleus flock allows school students to link studies with hands on experience in animal health, nutrition and husbandry practices and how best to care for their animals in different environments.

This challenge is aimed to provide a hands-on experience for students to become involved in the sheep and wool industry.


Year 11 and 12 Primary Industries students have been completing a fencing unit as a component of their studies. Bullying

Bullying is an ongoing and deliberate misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that intends to cause physical, social and or/psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power or perceived power, over one or more persons who feel unable to stop it from happening.

Students in secondary spent the day being upskilled on the "R U Ok?" Merriwa Central School bullying policy. Students participated and discussed what bullying is and the appropriate steps they need to take if they are a victim or

witness to ongoing bullying incidents. Students also learnt the process for aggressors, who choose not to undertake the relevant warnings of bullying and associated consequences.

Students are encouraged to ensure that they are not a bystander to behaviours that will not be accepted or tolerated at our school and report immediately to the appropriate staff member.

If a child reports ongoing issues to a parent, friend or loved one. Please phone the school to make an appointment to discuss further. Students in primary should contact the student's classroom teacher. Students in secondary should contact the child's Year Advisor.

Students who were absent on the delivery day will complete a catch up lesson. This will ensure that all students are well versed in Merriwa Central School processes.

NAPLAN – information for parents and carers



2022

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit in May each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students do.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools are transitioning from paper-based to computer-based assessments. Most schools will complete NAPLAN tests online in 2022. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students can participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experience of using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.





What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

Some familiarisation and explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN online test window is nine days. This is to accommodate schools that may have fewer devices.

The NAPLAN online test window starts on Tuesday 10 May and finishes on Friday 20 May 2022. Tests must be scheduled as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Online NAPLAN test scheduling requirements are detailed in the table below.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
