Principals Report

Our school is committed to providing a range of exciting learning opportunities for students. In the past few weeks students have participated in a range of activities including, the Red Hill Biology Camp, Horse Riding excursions, Athletics carnival, a Bell Shakespeare drama performance, walk safely to school activity, visit to Merriwa colonial museum, a Super Science Show, student feedback surveys, and Life Ready workshops for seniors. The cost of many of these activities has been heavily subsidised by the school (some in full) to ensure all students enjoy the range of experiences.

It is important that students return excursion permission notes on time to participate in these events, otherwise they may miss out on the opportunities on offer.

Student Behaviour

Our school is committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for safe and respectful learners.

Respect

We expect students to demonstrate respect in the school environment towards each other, teachers, support staff and school visitors.

Any student found in breach of school rules will be directed to hand the phone in at the office and will receive a warning of suspension. Parents can always leave messages for students at the office and they will be passed on by the office staff.

Students will assemble under the COLA at 7.45am for a departure time of 8.00am.



K-6 Assembly



Indigenous Program "Australia's Living **Indigenous History**"





Some examples of **PBL** at Merriwa **Central School**

Preliminary Biology Excursion to Red Hill Environmental Education Centre, Gulgong

On Tuesday May 10, Preliminary Biology students travelled to Goulburn National Park to participate in a two day practical under the guidance of staff from the Red Hill Environmental Education Centre (RHEEC).

Our first stop was Honeyeater Flats in the Munghorn Nature Reserve. Honeyeater Flat is so named for the bird species Regent Honeyeater that once populated the area, now critically endangered with 250 left in the wild. Rebecca and special guest David, who has been monitoring the Regent Honeyeater population since the 1980's tutored the students in the skills they would need to conduct their investigations.

The students' task was to investigate the suitability to two sites for the Honeyeater to dwell.

They determined the temperature, type of cover from the trees (exposed or not exposed), evidence of fires, types of rocks, rainfall and rainfall patterns, soil type and colouring, amount of light, elevation, compass aspect and soil moisture where the abiotic features investigated.

The biotic features investigated included tree types and how many of each species where present as well as the overall health of trees.

The students used investigative techniques such as using transects and quadrates to investigate sample areas for their suitability for Regent Honeyeaters.


Site one was in a covered area near a gully and creek. Students investigated the biotic (living) and abiotic (non-living) features of the area to determine if it would be a suitable habitat for the Regent Honeyeater.

Site 2 was located under the ridge line under the sandstone pagodas that Munghorn Gap Nature Reserve is surrounded by.

Using their investigating techniques, they were able to determine that the habitat that would best suit the Regent Honeyeater was at Site 2, as it was more open, contained more nectar producing eucalyptus, more nesting options as

they prefer to nest in the forks of branches on trees, however Site 2 did not contain as much Mistletoe as Site 1, which is a main source of food for the Regent Honeyeater.

Accommodation and meals were provided by RHEEC and was very comfortable and the meals were also excellent. The staff were polite and knowledgeable.

Day 2 - The Drip

Wednesday 11 May saw us leave the RHEEC and make our way to The Drip, which is also part of the Goulburn River National Park.

The day was overcast and threatened rain it was decided to complete the water quality and visual assessment of the area first before the rain set in.

Karen was our guide for this set of activities.

We collected water quality testing equipment such as thermometer, pH tester, conductivity tester, nets, bucket, handheld microscopes. We made our way to a section of the Goulburn River with a rocky/sandy bank to conduct our investigations.

The students used a GPS to determine latitude and longitude location as well as elevation of the area.

The western bank was heavily impacted by human activity were as the eastern bank was untouched by human activity. Under the guidance of Karen, the students evaluated the percentage of native tree canopy cover, understory cover, ground cover, regeneration of native trees as well as types and percentages of debris on both the western bank and the eastern bank. After careful consideration it was determined that the visual health of the area was good.

Quantitative data gather was the next step, provided through the assessment of water health. Students used a thermometer to determine the temperature of the water 15 oC, pH strips to determine the pH of the water pH of 7 (neutral), a turbidity to tube to determine the clarity of the river water, which was very clear, salinity was also measured.

The course of the Goulburn River has changed due to mining in the area and the mines remove water, use and then return it to the river as long as the salinity level is below 800 parts, the students recorded a level of 720.

Students then used small nets to try and capture invertebrate water bugs to determine the overall health of the water. A whirligig water bug was identified and there was large population found in the shallows close to shore, students also observed some guppies, though they were hard to catch.

It was concluded that the section of Goulburn River investigated was not suitable to sustain a diverse population of invertebrate water bugs due to its high salinity which means the whirligig water bug are a salt tolerant water bug.

After some morning tea we took a walk towards the Drip itself, with a stop at an area where ground water emerged. Along the way we observed the weathering of sandstone rocks and discussed the significance of the banded iron formations to who the level iron present at the time they were made, red means lots of iron reacting with oxygen to form iron oxide, light orange colours mean low iron levels.

Karen, our guide tested the ground water where it emerged and the salinity was determined to be 290, significantly lower than the river itself, suggesting that the ground water was not affected by the mines returning water to the river and the

pH was a 6, which is a low acidic level.

The rain started to make itself known so we were not able to make it to the Dripping rock on this occasion.

Over all the students enjoyed themselves and gained new skills to be able to use as they continue in their biology studies.


