
Tracey Forbes also spoke about possible School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships available to students next year.



## **Agriculture**

Senior Agriculture and Primary Industries students have had a productive first half of the year. Along with developing their theory knowledge in sustainable and modern agricultural production, students have gained new practical skills in farm machinery operation using the school tractor and attachments to prepare paddocks for sowing. With some regular rainfall our oat crop has done very well and is providing some high quality supplementary grazing for our two steers (Knobby and Milo). The steers are providing the students with an excellent opportunity to master their hands-on skills in livestock handling and monitoring. Thank you very much to Mr Col Bates of 'Kingslyn' who kindly donated one of the steers and arranged their delivery to the school.

Students developed their research and experimental design skills by conducting a chicken trial where they monitored the growth rate of meat birds in response to feed protein content. They have also had success in the garden producing some quality silver beet, Queensland blue pumpkins and zucchini to supplement our steady egg production.



- Justin Alley "This was a chance to learn new skills and ways we can use them in the future".












## Respectful communication is a right
