NAPLAN Tests

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, and is the only nationwide assessment that all Australian children undertake.

It's a measure to see whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning, and for their productive and rewarding participation in the community.

Students will complete the tests Wednesday to Monday March 13-20. Please make every effort for your child to be at school on those days.

NAPLAN 2024

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills. Students in Years 7 and 9 participate in the annual tests in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. All NSW schools will sit NAPLAN online in 2024.

Our school will be participating in NAPLAN between March 13 to 18, 2024. The schedule for the tests is as follows:

Thursday March 14 - Reading Test Friday March 15 - Conventions of Language test Monday March 18 - Numeracy test

Between March, Tuesday 19 - Monday 25 - a 'catch-up' day is scheduled for students who missed a test or were absent on a test day. Catch up days for writing are not permitted and can only take place on Wednesday March 13, 2024.
